**Fully Automatic Transmission Is '51 Chev. Feature**

Chevrolet for 1951, announced today, offers the first fully automatic transmission in the lowest price field — "Powerglide" — available as an option at extra cost.

In addition, the 1951 Chevrolet presents a new design profile, with longer, lower, more sweeping lines; new Jumbo-Drum brakes; and a selection of 12 models, including the new Chevrolet "Bel Air", Canada's first hard-top convertible.

The automatic transmission has been hailed as the most revolutionary driving aid since the advent of the self-starter," said E. J. Umphrey, director of sales, General Motors Products of Canada, Ltd. "By offering Canadian motorists 'Powerglide' — which replaces the mechanical gearshift and eliminates the clutch pedal — Chevrolet has assured itself of an even firmer hold on the position of Canada's sales leader."

"Powerglide," Mr. Umphrey continued, "is an automatic hydraulically operated mechanism of the torque converter type. It consists of two major units — a torque converter and a planetary gearset — with a system of hydraulic controls. The planetary gearset would not be necessary except that reverse and emergency low are required from time to time."

"The system is controlled by a selector lever mounted on the steering column, with positions marked on a plastic dial beneath the wheel. By setting the lever at any one of the positions — Park, Neutral, Drive, Low and Reverse in that order — the driver may select the transmission position he desires. He cannot start the engine unless the lever is set at Park or Neutral. As a safety precaution, an electrical switch is incorporated in the control linkage, making it impossible to start the engine in any of the driving positions of the control lever."

The new 1951 Chevrolet offers the "Bel-Air" to Canadian motorists for the first time. This luxurious six-passenger coupe possessing the swank of a convertible has all the practicality of the solid top. With the "Bel-Air" as leader, the latest series contains two individually-styled two-door sedans and two four-door sedans, a sport coupe and a business coupe — all, except the business coupe, available in either deluxe or standard models.

Chevrolet's 1951 design changes are highlighted by new rear fenders, suggestive of the "fin" motif, which contribute to the illusion of greater length and accentuate the car's lowness. Also featured is a completely new grille and massive new bumper guards.

**Bill Carse Dropped From Vancouver Team**

VANCOUVER, Dec. 16 — (CP) — Veteran Bill Carse of the Vancouver Canucks in the Pacific Coast Hockey League, has been given his outright release by owner Coley Hall.

The 35-year-old Carse was replaced as coach of the Canucks three weeks ago by Murph Chamberlain. The one-time star centreman, who played with New York Rangers and Chicago Black Hawks in the N. H. L., will remain in Vancouver. Hall plans a job for him outside the hockey organization. When Chamberlain took over the mentor's job, Carse remained as a player, but has played in only one game.

"I'm convinced of the truth of the old saying," said Chamberlain. "They never come back."

**Chicago, Detroit Winners Of NHL Games Saturday**

CHICAGO 3, TORONTO 2

TORONTO, Dec. 17 — (CP) — The injury-riddled Chicago Black Hawks, sparked by fine goaltending and the aggressive play of five rookie replacements, defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 3-2 here Saturday night before 12,961 National Hockey League fans.

With goalie Harry Lumley performing in sensational style, the rookies' display was enough to turn the tide against the league leaders, who only two nights before had humbled the third-place Hawks 7-1 in Chicago.

The loss was costly for Toronto. Captain Teeder Kennedy, No. 2 man in the N. H. L. scoring race, injured his hip early in the second period and didn't return to action. He will probably be out for several games.

Up from Chicago's U. S. H. L. farm club to replace injuries came Powell, Leier, Glen Smith, John Michaluk and Hugh Coffin.

The rookies scored two of Chicago's three tallies and turned in a tight checking performance.

**Birdie Tebbetts And Mike Guerra Sold By Clubs**

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Dec. 16 — (AP) — The Boston Red Sox sold catcher Birdie Tebbetts to Cleveland and bought catcher Mike Guerra from Philadelphia A's today in two cash deals involving veteran players.

Tebbetts, 36, hit 310 in 79 games with the Red Sox last season. The noisy little receiver with the squeaky voice is regarded as one of the smartest in the majors.

Under manager Joe McCarthy, Tebbetts caught almost every game in 1948 and 1949. After Steve O'Neill replaced McCarthy in mid-season of 1950 he was not worked so hard. Tebbetts' departure from the Red Sox clubhouse probably was determined when he made a speech at a New England dinner shortly after the season closed. He openly criticized some of his teammates, labelling them as "malcontents."

O'Neill traded Tebbetts away from Detroit to Boston in 1947 when he managed the Tigers.

The Red Sox get a 38-year-oldster in Guerra, a Cuban from Havana who hit 282 in 87 games with the A's last season. He originally came to the majors with Washington but has been playing for the A's since 1947. A last minute attempt to make a Philadelphia A's-White Sox swap fell through just before the A's delegation rushed to catch a plane. Jimmy Dykes, Philadelphia manager, offered outfielder Elmer Valo and infielder Billy Hitchcock for outfielder Gus Zernial, Frank Lane, White Sox general manager, said "No."

St. Louis Cardinals probably will join together with Boston Braves, Chicago Cubs or New York Giants for infield help, but nothing has materialized.

**Chandler Has New Allies**

CHICAGO, Dec. 17 — (CP) — Baseball Commissioner A. B. Chandler had two new allies today — Connie Mack, retired manager of Philadelphia Athletics and Mrs. Grace Comiskey, president of Chicago White Sox.

Mrs. Comiskey said the White Sox would back up Chandler's retention in any new vote on the matter.

Her son, Chuck Comiskey, is said to have been one of seven club executives who voted to oust the Commissioner in the secret St. Petersburg meeting last Monday.

Mrs. Comiskey is waiting for her son to return from Florida Monday to do some explaining. The widow of the late J. Lewis Comiskey, son of the club's founder, Charles A. Comiskey, said the Chandler episode was "crudely handled."

"I did not approve of it from the moment I heard of what had taken place," she said.

Chandler also drew some kind words from Connie Mack. "Mr. Chandler has done a great job as commissioner," said the A's former manager. "... I still have hopes he will stay in as commissioner. I think the men who fired him have made a terrible mistake."

**Teen-Agers Take Over Arena In Shippegan, N. B.**

SHIPPEGAN, N. B., Dec. 14 — (CP) — Youth came into its own at this Northern New Brunswick village when management of the Shippegan Arena was handed over to 15 teen-agers. Any financial balance after the season ends will be divided among them.

One of the first actions by the newly formed Shippegan Junior Athletic Association was to permit use of the arena by school children from 4 p. m. to 5 p. m. daily for hockey purposes, with Tuesday evenings also reserved for children.

The village is one of 10 represented in a newly organized New Brunswick Chaleur Bay Hockey League, designed to include communities interested in competition among younger players. The loop replaces the former Lower Gloucester Hockey League and will remain outside the New Brunswick industrial hockey organization.

**Canadiens Sign New Players**

MONTREAL, Dec. 17 — (CP) — Tommy Manastersky, football and hockey star, signed a contract Saturday with the National Hockey League's Montreal Canadiens.

The 20-year-old versatile athlete, recently named Montreal's "athlete of the year," belonged to Montreal Royals of the Quebec Senior Hockey League.

A star with Montreal Alouettes of the Big Four conference, Manastersky was loaned to the Habitants on a three-game, lend-lease agreement earlier this week and played such a good game in New York last Wednesday that bosses of the professional hockey club signed him.

The football star is one of 15 rookies called by the fourth-place Canadiens since the start of the season in an effort to climb back to top N. H. L. position.
