

Describe Ordeal Of Being Marooned In North Sask.

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask. (CP) Worries vary by the hour when you're marooned in the cold and wet of northern Saskatchewan's wilds, even inside Prince Albert National Park.

"At first we worried about not getting back to Saskatoon on time as we had promised," said John McMeans, 20-year-old law student from Saskatoon, who with W. H. Buddy Wright, also 20, a Saskatoon van line employee, spent three cold and hungry days marooned about 30 miles from civilization.

"Then we forgot about that and started to worry about starving to death," young McMeans said in an interview after the two returned safely to Prince Albert. "It was miserable in the rain and wind."

LEAKY CANOE

The young adventurers set out from Waskesiu, in Prince Albert National Park, about 50 miles northwest of here, for Lavelle lake on the northern boundary of the park. The route was about 40 miles long.

McMeans said they set out in a leaky canoe. "It was the only one we were able to rent." They paddled one day, then had to stop overnight to patch it.

After three more days, the two were only a few miles from their destination when trouble came. High winds whipped the water into waves which began to fill their flimsy canoe. They were forced to take to shore, where they pitched a tent.

"We ran out of food Monday the fourth day out," Wright said. "We had taken only a bit of bacon and a handful of porridge with us and this was all used up."

"The winds increased in force and it started to rain. Our tent began to leak badly and our sleeping bags were soaked. We were cold and hungry and couldn't start a fire because everything was wet."

They searched for berries, then

tried to fish, but had no luck at either effort. A moose came nearby once but they had no gun.

Finally they packed the canoe in a desperate attempt to go back to a campsite. Paddling hard, they made it.

It was Thursday morning then and they hadn't eaten since late Monday. Conservation officers found them at the campsite and returned them by truck to Waskesiu.

By the time they reached there, they were reported two days overdue and the RCMP at Prince Albert had begun organizing a search.

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- 1 1/4 cups lukewarm water
- 3 teaspoons salt

Stir in

- 4 cups once-sifted bread flour

and beat until batter is smooth and very elastic.

Cream in a large bowl

- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup fine granulated sugar

Gradually beat in

- 3 well-beaten eggs

Add to yeast mixture, about a third at a time, beating well after each addition.

Mix in

- 3 cups more once-sifted bread flour

Divide soft dough into 3 bowls to finish as three Specialties.

1. Butterscotch Nut Buns Melt 3 tablespoons butter or margarine in 8-inch square pan; brush sides of pan with fat; mix in 1 tablespoon corn syrup, 1/2 cup lightly-packed brown sugar and 1/2 cup broken walnuts or pecans. Combine in a shallow bowl 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon and 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. Cut out rounded spoonfuls of dough, coat with cinnamon mixture and place in pan; sprinkle with any remaining spiced sugar. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, about 35 minutes.

2. Cheese Pull-Aparts Line bottom of a greased 8-inch square pan with greased waxed paper. Cut half of dough into rounded spoonfuls; place in pan; sprinkle with 2 cups shredded cheese. Spoon remaining half of dough on top; grease tops. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, about 35 minutes.

3. Seed Buns Cut out rounded spoonfuls of dough and drop into greased muffin pans—each spoonful should about half fill a pan. Brush with melted butter or margarine; sprinkle with poppy seeds. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 20 to 25 minutes.
