**News & Views**  
 As Seen From Ottawa  
 (By Our Own Correspondent)

Nothing is so dead as yesterday's news. But yesterday's news is tomorrow's history. The front pages of today's newspapers present a fleeting picture of the contemporary scene. It is seldom we pause to review events immediately past. Time resolutely marches on and with it the headlines keep pace. A nine days' wonder is as rare as snow in summer. Only the Lindbergh case "broke" the front pages of the world's newspapers for more than a week in succession during the history of journalism. The laughter and tears of yesterday are soon buried in news files.

Yet there is some value in news retrospect, if only to enlighten, make more complete, the pages of today. In presenting news and views as seen from Ottawa, we don't hope to always be lagging behind the fresher printer's ink. We expect, now and then at least, to pass on items that in conversation are invariably introduced by "Have you heard?" Also, as a good newspaperman should, we hope to forecast coming events which cast their shadows before with reasonable accuracy as, say, the weatherman. But don't forget that he isn't always right.

Just to prove how good we are at divination, we will foretell an event some years hence on the most risky guessing next to horse-racing, politics. We would like to be the first to record that in our considered opinion the Liberal regime in P.E.I. will cease at the next election. Now that it is obvious that our foresight is a gift you will have confidence in our future predictions.

The most important news this week is not the revolt in Spain, nor the revolver-landing-under-King-Edward's-horse repercussions, nor the faltering steps in the Ethiopian dispute. It was the Nazi attempt to take from Poland the use of the "free" city of Danzig. Judged from the relative space given other stories by the newspapers and the attention given them by the news gathering agencies, we seem to be attaching undue importance to the story. Not at all. By news in this case we mean how the event will ultimately affect you and what interests us most; and in the last analysis, that is the acid test of news.

The other stories make good copy, i.e., good reading for the moment, but they are not fraught with the dynamite, the almost frightening possibilities of the Danzig story. Spain is not a first class power; is not a danger point in international relations. Danzig is one of the most dangerous. Few persons outside of Spain care whether the Leftists or the Rightists are in power, and the return of King Alfonso, if such were possible, would make slight change in the international picture. Sconer or later Germany and Poland will gamble their existence as a nation on possession of Danzig.

It is in this connection that the League of Nations' consideration of the Ethiopian question assumes the most importance. Italy and Germany are in a race to obtain their individual purposes. Each has been timing its blows. As sure as the League begins to turn its attention to punitive measures against Italy, Germany makes another move to regain her pre-war status. This, in turn, relieves the pressure on Italy. It is an exciting game of international chess.

With all due respect to the importance of our beloved monarch, the "attempt on his life" was by a crank. If by the accident of birth

McMahon had been an Italian, with the existing tension between Italy and England, it would have probably been a different story. On such little things do the destiny of man depend. But from the present evidence there is no reason to doubt that McMahon did not intend to assassinate the Emperor, whatever else his intentions may have been. At any rate, McMahon's attempt was not timed very well. The Nazi drive at Danzig is a masterpiece of timing. So was Hitler's reoccupation of the Rhineland.

Why should Great Britain—the greatest Empire on earth—so dread such an alliance against her? Although re-arming, Germany is still in no economic or financial position to wage a prolonged war. Although strongly militarized, Italy is vastly over-estimated as a military power—particularly by Mussolini.

The obvious answer is that if war came the belligerents would not be Germany, Italy and Great Britain alone. Besides, England would go to almost any length to avoid a war. Now, there is far more behind both those reasons than appears at the surface. But we will save that for a future pow-wow. Just this wish to comment on a war at present: Ever since the World War the Polish corridor was the powder keg on which the European nations had been sitting. It was evident almost from the moment that the Treaty of Versailles was signed that Germany would not be satisfied permanently to have her territory cut in two. It appears equally as evident that Poland would resort to war rather than relinquish her only sea port.

As for the rebellion in Spain, it may be a revolution; that is, a successful revolt. Leftist or Rightist, come or go, Spain is probably with almost the rest of Europe, heading almost for dictatorship. Contemporary political events in Europe have almost conclusively proved that there must be some permanence to the supreme state authority, whether dictatorship or monarchy. France is no exception and the United States (though not in Europe) seems to be the exception which proves the rule. England has much to be thankful for that she found freedom to expand economically, politically and socially under a benevolent monarchy.

There is \$8,200 awaiting the Island any time she wishes to claim it. Hon. Mr. McIntyre was notified several months ago that the money was available for disposition as soon as he could furnish details on how it would be expended. Apparently he has been too busy to reply.

This money is the amount allotted to P. E. I. from the million dollars voted for the Railway Grade Crossing Fund during the final session of the Bennett administration. The money was divided according to population of the provinces and is being distributed by the Board of Railway Commissioners. Offhand we can think of a number of crossings on the Island which certainly should be eliminated or have better protection provided.

Like nearly everybody else on the Island, we have been trying to find out where the National Park is to be located. The Parks Branch is not letting anything out. As much as we could learn was that the recommendation of those who made a survey has not yet been submitted to the Government. There is considerable tape to go through before the announcement is made. After a recommendation for the site has been submitted to the Ottawa government, the federal administration must obtain consent of the provincial government before the land is expropriated. So hold your hats on you people around Bonshaw, Dalry and such places.
