

Motorist Flees; Nets \$150 Fine

Pleading guilty to failing to stop at the scene of an accident, Kenneth Joseph O'Connor, Quebec, was fined \$150 and costs or 30 days. The accused appeared before Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC in Charlottetown this morning.

Constable Ian Oland of the Charlottetown detachment of the RCMP testified that the accused struck three other vehicles all in the vicinity of 100 yards. Total damage to the vehicles amounted to approximately \$900.

Oland stated that in the first accident Mr. O'Connor was ever the center line which possibly made him lose control of his car and resulted in a collision with the vehicle which resulted in a chain reaction. Following the accident, which occurred near the village of Southport, the accused ran into the woods but was later picked up in Charlottetown.

A second charge of assault against Lester Francis Gunn, York, and Leonard William Gunn, Savage Harbor, resulted in the former being fined \$25 and costs on a charge of striking Harold Francis Doyle on the face with his fists and scratching him on the chest with his fists.

A second charge of assault against Lester Gunn saw the accused plead not guilty to kicking Mrs. Sadie Elizabeth Doyle in the center line which possibly made him lose control of his car and resulted in a collision with the vehicle which resulted in a chain reaction.

Mr. and Mrs. Doyle are residents of Mt. Stewart.

Leonard William Gunn was fined \$25 and costs on a charge of assault against Mrs. Doyle and \$25 on the assault against Mr. Doyle.

Testimony from an RCMP member indicated that Mr. and Mrs. Doyle pulled into a service station to get gasoline and were followed by the two accused who just drove their car and assaulted Mr. Doyle. Evidence indicated that Lester struck Mr. Doyle on the face with his fists. Leonard hit him in the face with a garbage pail cover, and struck Mrs. Doyle who is pregnant, in the stomach and on the arms with his fists.

CASE ADJOURNED

Frederick Stewart Mosher, Savage Harbor, charged with undersized lobsters, had his case adjourned to July 18 to fix a date for trial. The accused was represented by Kenneth MacDonald who entered a not-guilty plea on his client's behalf.

The Fisheries department, which requested a two-week adjournment, is being represented by Fisheries Officer Warren Farrar.

The case of Norman Daniel McPhee of Long Creek was dismissed by Magistrate Johnston who said that under the circumstances there wasn't sufficient evidence to warrant a conviction.

Mr. McPhee was charged with driving without due care and attention. Magistrate Johnston said in consideration of the fact that the accused squealed his tires and drove a short distance on the wrong side of the highway two separate charges should have been laid.

Mr. McPhee said he was on the wrong side of the highway (Malpeque Road) because he intended on travelling south but suddenly changed his mind and turned on that side to head north. The accused also testified that there was no traffic coming in either direction and that he looked both ways before proceeding onto the travel portion of the highway.

Unusual Incidents Related By Major

It's 58 years ago today that this province's 105th Battalion received orders to leave Valcartier Camp for Halifax, en route to England in the First Great War, and Major T. E. MacNutt recalled today for this paper some of the unusual incidents that transpired one-half century ago.

Major MacNutt and Col. G. Elliott Full, both of Charlottetown, are the only surviving officers who were with the battalion at that time.

From the battalion orders of 12th July, 1916, Major MacNutt took this extract:

"At 6:10 a.m. (13th) sharp, in heavy marching order, the Battalion will parade for embarkation. All men carrying kit bags.

"Divisional on route. First division, Lieutenant-Colonel A. E. Ings. Composed of right half Battalion and Regimental Staff (A and B companies under Majors T. E. MacNutt and J. A. Stewart).

"Second division Officer Commanding Major R. H. Campbell. To be composed of Major T. H. E. Inman, Captain G. H. Stanway, Captain J. W. Dorsey and medical staff and left half of battalion (C and D companies).

Children Injured At Montague

Two young children were taken to hospital with possible head injuries and bruises when injured in a stock car race in lower Montague over the week end.

The children, Paul and Glenda Burhoe, son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Colby Burhoe of 210 Fitzroy Street were both struck by the wheel of an automobile which was propelled when it left the axle of a racing car.

Mr. Burhoe said the children, transferred to the P.E.I. Hospital in Charlottetown, were excited. Paul, four years, received possible head injuries and scratches. Six-year-old Glenda, reportedly struck on the forehead, was released from hospital yesterday.

Injuries of the children are not believed serious, the father said. The attending physician is Dr. E.S. Giddings.

Remaining children of the Burhoe family, which were inside the family car, were not injured.

Capital Cost Is Restored

OTTAWA (CP)—The government by order-in-council has restored normal capital cost allowance provisions for tax treatment of automotive equipment and construction contractors' movable equipment, the revenue department announced Monday.

Finance Minister Sharp announced in his budget March 29 that capital cost allowance on automotive equipment and contractors' movable equipment would be reduced to two-thirds of the regular rates as part of the government's program to stretch out the boom.

The budget announcement covered various classes of capital assets acquired during an 18-month period ending Oct. 31, 1967. The revenue department said the order restoring normal rates was passed Thursday.

It affects all self-propelled vehicles such as automobiles, trucks and tractors. It also affects movable equipment used by contractors, such as portable camp buildings and movable construction machinery.
