THE Scott Act cases at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court to-day were adjourned until Wednesday next.

VERY REV. VICAR-GENERAL LANGEVIN, of Rimouski, who has been the guest, for several days past, of His Honor the Lieut. Governor, is a brother of Sir Hector Langevin. He formed one of the party dining with Premier Sullivan last evening.

HIS GRACE, the Archbishop of Toronto, who is now visiting Charlottetown, attended the Queen's Levee when he visited London in 1874, and was the first Roman Catholic Prelate who has had that honor since the reign of James II.

THE Indians on the Indian reserve at Deseronto, Ont., becoming displeased with the dean, Baker, violently assaulted him on Sunday night last. They dragged him from his pulpit and threw him out of the church. Mr. Baker will lay the matter before the courts.

Father Nolan, of Ottawa, were during their stay the guests of Hon. Mr. Sullivan.

A LONG SWIM.—An interesting experimental swim took place on the 7th inst., when Denis F. Butler jumped from the Battery bath, pier No. 1 North River, New York, at half-past two, and started for the Athletic club boat house, on the Harlem river. With a strong flood tide in his favor, but through a quite rough sea, Butler reached Fulton ferry in 15 minutes, and the bridge in 17 minutes. At half-past three, after dodging ferry boats, tugs and other craft, he had reached Hunter's Point, and at 4th, 25th, was off Ward's Island. Butler arrived at the Athletic club boat house, at a distance of about thirteen miles, at 4h. 33 m., two hours and thirteen minutes from time of starting. Professor Donovan and Gus Sundstrom will swim over the same course for \$250 a side on an early date.

ALTAR BOYS' SPREAD.—Quite an interesting event for the Altar Boys of St. Dunstan's Cathedral was the spread and entertainment given them last night in St. Patrick's Hall.
