THE PROSPECTS BEGINT.—There are prospects of good times in Summerside during the coming summer, as, in addition to more building than usual, and the ordinary coasting trade, there is likely to be greater activity than ever before in steamboat traffic. We have the Northumberland and the Fawcett, which make Summerside one of their termini, and the Quebec Steamship Company will probably put a splendid new boat on the Montreal and Gulf ports route, besides which there will in all probability be calls from the Montreal and Newfoundland steamers, and one of the Boston steamers, and the establishment of the proposed steamboat route between Bacc Verte and Summerside. The more the merrier, and the better for the town, and every possible encouragement should be given steamship lines to include Summerside in their route.—Journal.

NEW BACK TOWER AT TRACADIE.—The tower from which the inner or back range light at Tracadie was exhibited, at the west entrance to Tracadie Bay, on the north of Gulf of St. Lawrence coast of Prince Edward Island, has been replaced by a new tower, from which the light will be shown on the opening of navigation in 1894. The new tower is a square wooden building painted white. The upper portion of the superstructure is the lantern. The light from the ground to the top of the lantern is 28 feet. The light is a fixed red catoptric light. It is elevated 22 feet above high water mark, and should be visible in the line of range and up the coast in a northwesterly direction 8 miles. The tower stands on the gravel beach, near the site of the old one which it replaces, 1,200 feet S. S. W. from the front range light, but this course and distance are liable to be changed at any time without notice to mariners. The most suitable changes in the shifting channel.—Canada Gazette.
