

Dr. F. MacKinnon Speaks To Y's Men

Dr. Frank MacKinnon was guest speaker at the Remembrance Day meeting of the Alpha Y's Men's Club held in the banquet room of the Y.M.C.A. last night.

Co-chairmen of the meeting were two well known veterans, Y's Men Major George Craig and Lt. Col. Fred Andrew.

One guest was introduced to the club, Jim Chalmers of St. John's, Nfld.

Dr. MacKinnon's address, in keeping with the topic of remembrance, dealt with some aspects of the war history of Canada which he traced very interestingly in chronological order from the earliest skirmishes with the Indians through the wars between the early French settlers and the English, and later between Canada and the United States up to modern times.

The speaker dealt with the fine war record of Canada in the Boer War and the two world wars, and the emergence of Canada as a powerful nation in the modern world with well organized military, air and naval forces.

"At this time of remembrance," said the speaker, "we would do well to keep in mind not only the sacrifices and valor of the veterans of the two world wars, but also those of our forebearers of the past three hundred years who have passed on this country to us intact."

On behalf of the Y's Men, Lt. Col. Fred Andrew extended thanks to Dr. MacKinnon for his timely and instructive address.

The afternoon session opened with a worship service conducted by Mrs. Stanley Younker and Mrs. Clayton Cudmore of North Winsloe Y.P.U. Theme for the worship service was "A Day of Remembrance."

A cordial welcome was extended by Edna MacEwen, which was responded to by Mrs. George Hayden of Cherry Valley.

The business meeting followed conducted by the president, Anna Matheson. Roll call was answered by 64 members, representing 11 unions. A very interesting report on National Council held at Whitby, Ontario, was given by the Presbytery delegate, Anna Matheson.
