Canadiens Tie With New York Rangers Saturday

MONTREAL (CP)—New York Rangers and Montreal Canadiens battled to a 2-2 tie Saturday night in a spirited National Hockey League game in which the work of the goalies was outstanding.

Two defencemen, Bill Gadsby and Harry Howell, scored for the Rangers while third-line forwards Don Marshall and Claude Provost scored for Canadiens.

A crowd of 13,461 saw fast skating and solid checking that were more of mid-season variety. The tie left each club with a win and a draw in their two starts in the new hockey season.

Canadiens held the offensive edge through the latter stages of the final period when both teams, although tiring, cut loose in an effort to break the tie. But neither goalie Lorne Worsley of the Rangers nor Charlie Hodge of Canadiens, filling in the ill Jacques Plante, would give up the tie-breaker.

Hodge had 34 shots to handle throughout the game while Worsley had 32. Four penalties were called against each team, including a major to Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard of Canadiens for slashing a Ranger defenceman Larry Cahen.

Canadiens twice held a one-goal lead but couldn't hang on to it against the spirited Rangers.

Allie Reynolds In Court Monday

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Allie Reynolds, former New York Yankees pitcher, sat in court Monday as a jury was chosen for trial of his civil suit for \$235,000 damages against the Philadelphia Transportation Co.

Reynolds filed the suit for injuries allegedly suffered in a bus accident July 7, 1953.

Reynolds and his Yankee teammates were riding in a PTC bus that crashed into a metal elevated structure.

Reynolds said he was thrown to the aisle, injuring his back, which resulted in his eventual retirement from baseball.

Among witnesses scheduled to testify for Reynolds are outfielder Mickey Mantle, catcher Yogi Berra, New York pitching coach Jim Turner and trainer Gus Mauch.

NHL President Campbell Will Arrange A Meeting

TORONTO (CP)—National Hockey League president Clarence Campbell said Saturday he would be happy to arrange a meeting between NHL club owners and "players or their active players representatives" to discuss mutual problems.

Campbell said at a press conference there never has been nor is there any objection by NHL club owners to meet with the players at any convenient time.

He described as untrue published statements attributed to Doug Harvey of Montreal Canadiens, first vice-president of the NHL Players' Association.

Campbell quoted a report in which Harvey said: "The players had done all in their power to have club owners meet with them and discuss their proposals."

He denied that Harvey had, as another report said, "made a personal appeal to me to use my good offices to bring about such a meeting, and that the owners had refused."

Campbell's statement was the first official word from the NHL since counsel for the NHL Players' Association filed suit Oct. 9 for \$3,000,000 damages and asked the voiding of the standard play-

er's contract.

Campbell did say that since the formation of the players' association, there have been several requests that either he or the club owners meet with the players association's New York attorneys, J. Norman Lewis and Milton N. Mound.

Since the NHL solicitors were already engaged with the players' association through a charge of "unfair labor practices" filed with the national labor relations board of the United States, Campbell said it was impossible to meet with Mound. He said he advised Mound to that effect.

Fight Card Friday

Charlie Hogan's summer program of sporting events at Civic Stadium is drawing to a close. It seems fitting that the last boxing card of the season, to be held at the stadium this Friday, should promise to be the greatest of the year. All four bouts on the card have within them the seeds of explosive action.

Very often the curtain raiser on such a card is a bout between youngsters who are not expected to provide much stirring action though the kids often do show signs of future greatness. Then comes those "shoot-the-works" hordes, Rogers of Borden and Oliver of Alberton. Those boys don't worry too much about defence. They just keep throwing everything but the ringer's and referee, and how they both stand up un-

der such a terrific bombardment is a pugilistic mystery. So far they haven't succeeded in knocking each other out, but they've been a knockout as far as fistie attractions are concerned.

Then the main bout between Bud Ramsay and "Peanuts" Arsenault, two local boys who have been sparring partners all summer has the whole sporting fraternity of the town talking. Arsenault has come along very fast this summer. He has been very impressive in bouts with "Whipper" Steele and Ray MacNeill, and he will have lots of supporters in his fight against Ramsay. "Peanuts" seems to have picked up a sleeper punch somewhere along the way this season, and his fans say that Ramsay will hit the deck when he tangles with Arsenault. Bud has a lot of supporters too, who are willing to bet dollars against doughnuts that Arsenault won't be in there for ten rounds. They point to the fact that Bdd also has a punch that has been known to petrify opponents, and they claim further that Ramsay's boxing ability will give him an edge over Arsenault. Shantz And Podres Lead Majors In Earned Runs

NEW YORK (AP)—Lefthanders Bobby Shantz of New York Yankees, who made one of baseball's finest comebacks, and Johnny Podres of Brooklyn Dodgers captured the major league earned run championships in 1957.

Figures compiled by the Associated Press disclosed Monday that Shantz took the American League crown with a 2.45 earned run average. The pint-sized 32-year-old hurler allowed only 47 runs in 178 innings while winning 11 games and 10 in five.

Podres, who was in the U.S. Navy last year, collected two distinctions. Not only did he top the senior circuit in earned run percentage with 2.66, but he also paced the majors in shutouts with six.

The Dodgers' mainstay permitted 53 earned runs in 186 frames. He won 12 games and lost nine.

M. Richard Scores Three Goals; Bruins Beat N.Y.

DETROIT (CP)—Maurice (The Rocket) Richard scored three times—the 32nd "hat-trick" of his 15-year career—and boosted his all-time total to 497 goals, while leading the Montreal Canadiens to a 6-0 victory Sunday night over Detroit's defending National Hockey League champions.

Dickie Moore also got three goals for Montreal while substitute goalie Charlie Hodge made 24 saves in posting the shutout.

The Canadiens took advantage of penalties by scoring four times when Detroit had a man in the penalty box.

Richard also assisted on one of the goals by linemate Moore in

celebrating one of his biggest nights.

Detroit's usually hostile fan mildly cheered the aging veteran each time but then gave him a standing ovation when he notched No. 3 at 7:10 of the final period. It came on a high 10-foot flint of Bert Olmstead's passout.

Moore got his last two goals in the last eight minutes when the Wings summed.

Big OTTAWA QUARTER

The Rough Riders made their biggest scoring display in the third quarter when Bob Judd and Bill Sowalski intercepted passes for touchdown gallops of 60 and 50 yards and Gary Schreider added a field goal.

In addition to touchdowns, by Judd and Sowalski, Ted Smale scored one for the Riders—after a blocked kick early in the opening quarter. Schreider kicked

three converts in addition to his field goal.

Art Powell's 60-yard run after picking up an Ottawa fumble and a one-yard crack through the line by Joel Wells accounted for Montreal's two other touchdowns in addition to Patterson's pair. Bewley missed one field goal attempt that went for a single but kicked his three - points on his later attempt and also kicked three converts. Avatus Stone booted for a Montreal single.

ARGUS STRONGER
