See Living Polio Virus Vaccine As Ultimate Goal. SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A vaccine made from living polio virus, as distinguished from the "killed" virus of the Salk vaccine, probably will be the eventual answer to the infantile paralysis problem, a group of experts agree. A live virus vaccine should be the ultimate goal, they say, because it offers the best chance of conferring long-lasting immunity. But most agree that the Salk vaccine meanwhile is the best available weapon against the disease. The Salk vaccine, these experts have told the California Medical Association, depends upon a carefully-drawn balance between its ability to cause the disease and its ability to produce immunity. Rapidity with which the virus is killed during the vaccine-making process is an important factor. If it is killed too slowly it may lose some of its power to produce immunity in the injected person. If killed too slowly in the production process some individual viruses in it may remain lively enough to cause the disease in its recipient. NEEDS CAREFUL HANDLING. A vaccine made from a live virus would not have the potent drawback of weak protective powers, but unless carefully handled it might involve the risk of causing disease. So it has to be altered in the living state to make it incapable of causing the disease before being used as vaccine material. Two kinds of vaccine made from living virus now are under trial and may reach the practical stage in a few years, said Dr. Edwin H. Lennette, who headed the panel. Dr. Lennette, of the California health department, was one of a group which in Washington last week decided the Salk vaccine produced by five drug houses is safe. The vaccine made by a sixth manufacturer, Cutter Laboratories of Berkeley, Calif., was withdrawn after several cases of polio appeared among children vaccinated with its product.

Meets Parents First Time. MONTREAL (CP)—A 12-year-old Polish girl has begun life afresh with the parents she never knew. They were embraced and tears of joy and even frightening confusion for little Janina Pierzchalski when she arrived by air from Warsaw Thursday amidst the excited welcoming at Dorval airport. Her parents, Boleslaw Pierzchalski, 34, and his 30-year-old wife told of their deportation 13 years ago to a Nazi concentration camp. That was only a few weeks after their marriage, so on after the Germans had overrun Poland. "My wife became pregnant soon after we arrived," said the father. "The Germans insisted she go back to Poland to give birth to the child. But they didn't tell us she would have to leave Janina behind and come back to the camp alone. "I have never seen my child until this day, but I luckily she has been with my wife's parents all the time and even has gone to school." He said that after the war when the Russians took over Poland, he was unable to go back home and up to now Janina was not allowed to leave.
