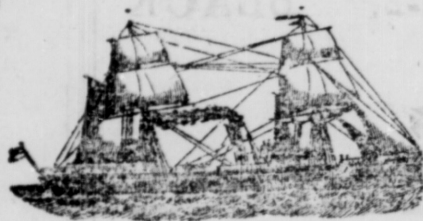

Queer Fishes.

Amphibious fishes are to be found in various quarters of the globe. GENERAL BLANCO ADMITS DEFEAT.

Americans Captured San Juan Near Santiago.

SPANISH LOST 20 00 AT EL CANEY.

Half Their Men Hors de Combat — General Linares Wounded.

MADRID, July 4.—Blanco reports to the Government under date of July 1st that the Americans have taken San Juan, a town outside Santiago de Cuba, and that the Spaniards were able to save their artillery though half the troops were placed hors de combat.

General Linares was severely wounded in the left arm and relinquished his command.

El Conez is also conceded lost. The Spanish losses were heavy.

WASHINGTON, July 4.—The transports have arrived at Manila with reinforcements for Dewey.

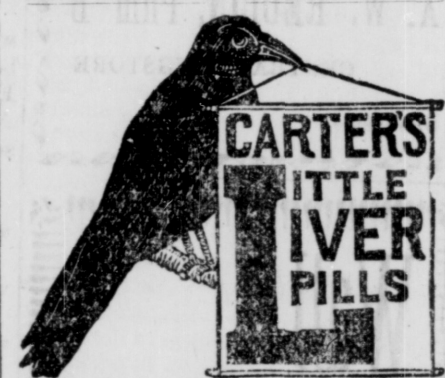
On the way they touched at Gukanaa Ladrone Islands, and took possession of the city of Marena.
