LOBSTERS—Fish dealers in New York have begun an agitation for the passage of a law relating to lobster fishing. The supply from the New England coast has greatly fallen off in the last five years, and has been supplemented by shipments from the provinces. An effort will now be made to secure regulations tending toward an increase in the local supply.

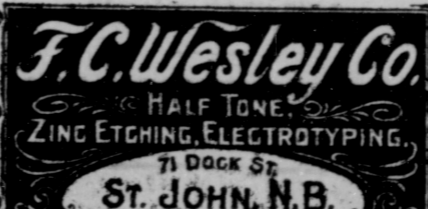
