Strange But True

In the U. S. A. there is one automobile for every four people. In England there is one for every 22 people and in Joe Stalin's country there is one for every 252 people.

Radio ownership is about the same. In the U. S. A. one for every three people; in England one for every 5; and in Russia one for every 45 people.

Canada as a whole is blessed with telephone service though many persons abuse the system by talking too long and cofering subjects that don't require covering. In this country there is one phone for every ten people as compared to one for 155 and one to 188 in England and Russia, respectively.

One hears a lot of beefing about prices and about wages. Yet we must remember that in this country, every six minutes on the average of working time will buy a pound of sugar. In the British Isles it takes eight minutes (and sugar is rationed over there) and in Russia it takes 14 1-2 minutes. A quart of milk requires ten minutes in this country, 19 minutes in the Mother Country (subsidized and rationed) and 50 1-3 in Russia.

When we consider that the government doesn't produce anything, it ought to be careful about giving away something or anything, produced by the people.

There's a place for the government, of course, but the government should stay in its place. Perhaps its human nature to like to get something for nothing but somebody has to foot the bill. From present indications we will all have to make some sacrifices. It's easy to pick out the best people in a community: they'll help you do it.

Would Permit Fines On Instalment Plan

MONTREAL, Dec. 4—(CP)—Thousands of Canadians are being sent to prison for the modern version of imprisonment for debt, that is the opinion of Alex Edmison, Vice-President of Queen's University and President of the National Prisoners Aid Association of the United States.

In a recent address here he said: "This is supposed to be a democratic country, but daily in courts throughout Canada, people are going to jail because they haven't enough money to pay fines. It is about time the law changed so that people will be permitted to pay fines on the instalment plan."

Mr. Edmison said Canadians must give a better break to the 80,000 men, women and children who are released from Canadian penal institutions each year, given ten dollars and sent on their way.

He said the reformative approach, rather than the merely punitive, must be used in all institutions so that those released don't go back again.

Mr. Edmison said another point needing immediate attention was the present-day system of "no money, no lawyer." He was glad that Ontario this year adopted a legal aid scheme.

Tropical Dream Cake

2 1/2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour	1 tablespoon grated orange rind
2 1/2 teaspoons Columet Baking Powder	1/2 cup shortening
4/4 teaspoon salt	1 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon rind	3 eggs, unbeatn
	2 tablespoons lemon juice
	* Milk (see below for amount)

* With butter, margarine, or lard use 3/4 cup milk. With shortening, use 1/2 cup milk.

• Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt; sift together three times. Add lemon and orange rinds to shortening and cream well; add sugar gradually, cream until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each. In small amounts, add flour alternately with lemon juice, then milk; beat smooth after each addition. Turn into 2 round 9-inch layer pans, 1 1/2 inches deep, lined on bottoms with paper then greased. Bake in moderate oven (375 deg. F.) about 20 minutes. When cool, fill and cover with a snowy white frosting. Decorate with silver dragées. (There's a grand "White Fudge Frosting" on page 77 of "Learn to Bake—You'll Love It".)
