**Submarine Telephony.**

An Important Cable Required for  
Transatlantic Communication.

It was Professor Sylvanus Thompson,  
of London, that so electricians are talking  
again about what is known as submarine  
telephony. He was in the United States  
some months ago and he declared his be-  
lieve that a cable constructed as he  
made it would cost millions of dollars  
to make the electricians call self in-  
duction balance and neutralize certain  
other elements of difficulty in the prob-  
lem would render it possible to talk from  
the Old World to the New. Practical  
electricians see small prospects of results  
from Professor Thompson's suggestion,  
as it would cost some millions of dol-  
lars to test the accuracy of his theory.  
He admits that his special form of  
cable would be costly and difficult to  
make and lay.

It is generally held by electricians  
that a cable with a thick enough con-  
ducting core properly insulated would  
carry the human voice under the ocean.  
Some electricians guess that the cable,  
insulating coat and all, that should carry  
speech under the Atlantic must be a  
foot in diameter. This is arguing from  
known facts, but unforeseen difficulties  
might arise. When the electrician has  
taken into account all he knows he is  
sometimes balked in practice by the  
development of things that he does  
not know. The building of such a  
cable, or of that suggested by Professor  
Thompson, is believed to be a long way  
off.

The only man who has suggested a  
method of sending human speech under  
the ocean by means of cables now in  
use is J. C. Carthy, a widely known elec-  
trical engineer of this city who set forth  
his theory in a lecture about five years  
ago. Another man thought of the idea of  
sufficient practical importance to have it  
patented. When Mr. Carthy thinks so  
perhaps the other fellow will hear from  
him.

When a telegraph operator cables  
across the Atlantic there is an apprecia-  
ble length of time between the commu-  
nication of the impulse here and the re-  
cording of it on the other side, and the  
second impulse must be withheld until  
such time has elapsed. For this reason  
the human voice cannot be directly  
transmitted by cables now in use, so to  
speak in such fashion that no clear  
record would be made upon the other  
side. Mr. Carthy suggests that the mes-  
sage be first talked into a phonograph  
upon one side of the Atlantic; that the  
phonograph then be connected with the  
cable and turned at such a rate that  
the impulses shall not crowd one  
another. A slowly moving phonograph  
on the other side would receive the mes-  
sage, and having its record of the mes-  
sage, it would revolve rapidly enough for  
the sound to be received by the human ear.  
Mr. Carthy believes his plan perfectly  
sound in theory, but he admits that it  
would take a long time to send such a  
message. No experiment has been tried  
to demonstrate its practicability, partly  
because Mr. Carthy is too busy earning a  
living in the service of a telephone com-  
pany to take six months off for devising  
the necessary machinery for the experi-  
ment, and partly because the cable com-  
panies are not likely to trouble them-  
selves about such a matter.—New York  
Sun.

**THE SUN'S PUMPING WORK.**

At a recent meeting of the Engineers'  
Club of this city Joseph T. Richards  
made some interesting remarks on the  
actual work of lifting performed by the  
sun's rays in the absorption of water  
from through the atmosphere. He said:  
"For many years past I have been much  
interested in matters relating to the  
composition of the atmosphere and the  
work done by the sun in raising the  
moisture afterwards precipitated as  
rain. Professor Loomis claims that the  
average height of clouds is two miles.  
Although this is probably correct, I  
think there is no doubt on the other  
hand that many clouds from which we  
see rain falling are within half a mile  
of the surface of the earth. To make  
a moderate calculation let us assume as  
a minimum distance 2,000 feet. If you  
figure it out you will find that a rain-  
fall of one inch in an hour would amount  
to 72,000 tons of water deposited on each  
square mile, to elevate which 3000 feet  
would mean a work equal to that of  
220,000 horse power. To raise this water  
in an hour by pumping engines giving a  
duty of 100,000,000 foot-pounds, would  
require the consumption of 340  
gross tons of coal. I think this will  
help us to appreciate the immense  
amount of work being done by the sun  
in storing up our natural water supply.  
If the average elevation of Philadel-  
phia is 84 feet, then we have 4517 horse-  
power developed for each square mile  
for a rainfall run-off of an hour. When  
these quantities are considered the won-  
der is that when we have such down-  
pours as that which caused the John-  
stown flood the damage is not much  
greater than it was on that occasion."

**Notice to Commercial  
Travellers.**

The attention of Commercial Travellers is  
called to the following sections of an Act  
passed by the Legislative Assembly of Prince  
Edward Island, Session 1884, entitled "AN  
Act to Impose a Direct Tax on Certain Classes  
of Traders."

From and after the passing of this Act  
every casual trader not permanently residing  
in the Province, and every person not perma-  
nently residing in the Province, and who sells  
either for himself or any other person any  
goods, wares or merchandise in the Province,  
or solicits or canvasses for orders either for  
himself or any other person for the sale, ex-  
change or purchase of any goods, wares or  
merchandise, or solicits or canvasses for or-  
ders for the sale, exchange or purchase of any  
goods, wares or merchandise, in any manner  
allowed within this Province without having  
first paid the said license fee, shall be liable  
to the said tax of one dollar, and shall be  
deemed to have paid the said tax, either by  
every occasion upon which he or she shall  
sell any goods, wares or merchandise, or sol-  
icits or canvasses for orders for the sale, ex-  
change or purchase of any goods, wares or  
merchandise, as aforesaid, be liable to pay the  
sum of two hundred dollars to the said Pro-  
vincial Treasurer.

This Act is now in force.
