

CORONER'S INQUEST.—An Inquest was held on Wednesday last, by Dr. Beer, one of the Coroners for Queen's County, on view of the body of William Martin, painter, of this City, who was found dead in "Coles' Woods." It appeared in evidence, that the deceased had been for a few weeks past in a melancholy, unsettled state of mind, and that he disappeared on Saturday last, taking with him the means of self-destruction. Search was made for him up to Wednesday, when a number of men started to range the woods around the city; and almost immediately on entering the woods at Belvidere Farm, the unfortunate young man was found, lying on his face, perfectly dead. A gun barrel lying near him, and a wound quite through the left breast, implicating the heart, sufficiently showed the manner of death.

Verdict.—"Suicide while laboring under temporary insanity."—*Com.*

FROM EUROPE.

LONDON, May 22.—Flood and Duffy, the Fenian prisoners, who were recently convicted at Dublin, have been sentenced to imprisonment for life at hard labor. McClure, another Fenian prisoner, was placed on trial at Cork to-day.

PARIS, May 22.—The differences between the Emperor Napoleon and the Corps Legislatif, with regard to the army organization scheme, have been adjusted.

LONDON, May 22.—Mr. Stewart, chairman of the Board of Directors of the Anglo American Company, publishes another communication in the London Times this morning. He says the broken cable will be repaired and ready for business in three weeks from this date.

LONDON, May 17.—Despatches have been received from Athens which state that two sanguinary battles had taken place recently in Candia, in both of which the Turkish Commander, Omar Pacha, had been defeated. His loss in engagements is computed at 3000 men. The great powers of Europe have again united in a petition to the Sublime Porte to cede the Island of Crete to the Greek Government.—Orders have been issued in Council for the prevention or restriction of the ravages of the rinderpest which has again made its appearance in some counties in England.—An Imperial decree has been promulgated favoring the Protestant inhabitants of Hungary.

LONDON, May 19, (evening).—The Luxemburg question is to be regarded as finally settled, for the Emperor Napoleon and King William of Prussia have signed the treaty looking to that end.

LONDON, 21, evening.—Earl Derby says officially that the American Question will be amicably adjusted.—The proposition made some time ago to arbitrate the whole case has been refused.

BRUSLS, May 21.—A horrible plot has just been discovered in Hanover having for its purpose the assassination of King William of Prussia, and Count Bismarck. Several notable persons in this city are involved in the plot.—Numerous arrests both here and at Hanover have been made of persons believed to be implicated, and it is thought that by those timely precautions the design has been frustrated.

LONDON, May 23.—Her Majesty the Queen has issued her Royal Proclamation declaring the Union of the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, under one Government, to be called the "Dominion of Canada."—Appended to the proclamation is a list of Senators appointed by the Queen to the Upper House of the Canadian Legislature, in accordance with the provisions of the Bill of the confederation recently passed by the British Parliament.

LONDON, May 23, evening.—The British Government has made representations to the leading Powers of Europe, urging a general disarming.

St. Petersburg, May 23.—The ice in the Neva has broken up and is fast disappearing, and the river is now open to navigation.

Vienna, May 23, evening.—The Austrian Minister at Washington has been instructed by his Government to enter into negotiation, with the President of Mexico with a view to securing the safety of the Emperor Maximilian, in case he should fall into the hands of the Liberals.

LONDON, May 24.—Sir Archibald Allison, the historian, is dead.

The Oak Races which took place to-day, was won by "Hepple."

Cork, May 24.—The Fenian prisoner, MacClure, on being arraigned for treason, made a plea of Guilty.

Paris, May 24.—The frigate *Jean Bart*, of the French West India squadron, has been ordered to proceed to New York to take the monitor *Dunderberg* to France. The *Jean Bart* is now lying at Annapolis, Md.

Liverpool, May 21.—Advices received here from Hong Kong say that it is stated there that the United States gunboat *Apsolut* had bombarded a town in the island of Formosa, the natives of which murdered the shipwrecked crew of the American barque *Rover*.

FROM THE STATES.

NEW YORK, May 23.—From all accounts the Fenian Warriors are again about to take the field, in large numbers, for an invasion of Canada. A movement towards organization and concentration is general throughout the Northern and Western portions of New York and other States. A messenger has been despatched by the Head Circles to call brothers to arms, and 30,000 men are to be concentrated on the border within a month. The commissariat department is said to be well supplied, and large quantities of army stores are already warehoused in the vicinity of St. Alban's.

Gen. Spear is to command the invading army. On the other hand, the Canadians are alive to the danger, and are actively preparing to defend themselves. The Hon. John Morrissey has been at Troy, N. Y., in conference with the Fenian leaders and it is believed that he has been authorized to assure them that United States Government would not interfere with their enterprise.

Hence bitter disappointment has followed the use of the various extracts of Sarsaparilla which flood the market, until the name itself has become synonymous with imposition and cheat
