The Abbies secured their lead in the first inning, with Lou Campbell pitching for the Beavers. The Abbies seemed to hit at will and had five runs to their credit before the side was retired.

"Lefty" McQuaid was put in the box for the remaining six innings and only allowed two runners to cross the home plate. For his first appearance in the senior ranks, he demonstrated to the batters that he had a wicked left and was entitled to a place in this position.

The field was marked quite distinctly, and in great improvement on the old diamond; also the socks are securely pegged down, which gives both base runners and basemen a better advantage in handling the ball.

The Committee, Messrs. F. P. Hennessey, James McEachern and James Coyle, are to be commended on the interest they are showing in keeping the fans to the grand stand and looking after the public as they should be. No doubt this will have the desired effect, and next game will see an even larger attendance.

Should the remaining games keep on a par with that of last evening there is no doubt that baseball will gain in popularity and the series will be a grand success.

6th, Beavers—Purcell out to Howatt, infield fly; E. Arsenault out to Howatt, infield fly; Ruthledge fans.

6th, Abbies—Kinsman hits to Cameron, who fumbles, steals second; McQuaid out to Cameron; McEachern out to A. Arsenault, outfield fly; Howatt batters a liner to "Lefty" who handles it nicely. Abbies, 7; Beavers, 2.

7th, Beavers—Currie out at first by Kinsman; Ross fans; McQuaid nice hit for single; Cronin hits three bagger, bringing home McQuaid; A. Arsenault singles to first. Cronin going home; Cameron hits nice home run, bringing in Arsenault, but it was claimed a foul ball and Arsenault was sent back to third; Cameron got free pass to first, and stole second; Purcell fans.

NEW CONSTITUTION IS ADOPTED BY DAUGHTERS OF THE EMPIRE.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 3.—Adoption by a vote of 1423 to 200 of a new constitution for the test period of five years, tending to promote more efficient operation of the machinery of the Order, approval of the disarmament policy adopted at the Washington conference and a short discussion which developed practical unanimity of opinion among the delegates as to the need of a system of selective immigration, featured yesterday's sessions of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire convention here.

One of the most important changes in the constitution is a clause making it possible for the office of National President to be filled by other than a resident of Toronto.

The new constitution differs from the old also according to the report of Mrs. A. W. McDougall, convener of the committee in that:—

1.—It embodies incorporation of chapters.

2.—It refrains from any further reference to the Imperial Chapter than is warranted to chapters, as the organization of an Imperial Chapter could be granted only by an act of the British Parliament.

3.—Refrains from further mention of granting of charters to other national chapters than authorized in the act of incorporation.

4.—Provides for a full use of chapters powers to make by-laws for management of their own business.

municipal councillors are ex-officio fire guardians, with authority to enforce the Act. Municipal councils must appoint fire guardians.

Fire guardians have the power to order out any male person over sixteen years of age to help in fighting a prairie or forest fire. There are of course the usual exemptions in the case of postmasters, physicians, telegraph operators etc.

Spark arresters must be used on marine engines, with a view to preventing fires originating from sparks thrown from the smokestacks of steamboats operating on northern lakes and rivers. Provision is made for the establishment of fire districts. In these (unburned areas, it is illegal to start clearing fires between 15th April and 15th November, without a special permit.

The scale of penalties for violation of the Forest Fire Act has been revised and the penalties made heavier, so that there will be greater respect for the Act. A woman's jury in Chicago has decided that a gown is out of style after four weeks. Old stuff—that's what every husband knows.

Many important amendments were made of the Forest and Prairie Fire Act of the province of Alberta at the last session of the legislature. The principal of these amendments, which will greatly lessen the difficulty of combating fires, and which are welcomed by all who have to do with the forests are the following:—
