Royals Beat St. Dunstons University 12-8 At Arena

The Charlottetown Royals defeated St. Dunstan's University 12-8 in an exciting hockey contest played at the Sports Arena last night.

The Royals showed too much power for their college opponents, with Kip Ready leading the attack with four goals. Merrill Pineau and Angie Carroll each fired two while Willie Carver, Lloyd Shepherd, Willie Dunn and Art Perry collected singles.

Billy Mulligan and Ray Hache each scored a brace for the Saints while Claude Peters, S. MacDonald, J. Murphy and O'Neill got one apiece.

TAKE EARLY LEAD
The Royals jumped into an early lead with Merrill Pineau scoring after only three minutes and twelve seconds of play.

Pineau's tally came after he and Kip Ready came in on a lone defenceman. Ready was in possession of the puck and pulled the defenceman to one side before passing to Pineau who by this time was in front of the net. Merrill's hard shot got by Redmond to give the Royals a 1-0 lead.

About three minutes later Kip Ready put the Royals two goals up when he knocked in a rebound. Before this Lloyd Shepherd while deep in St. Dunstan's territory passed to Junior MacLeod who was standing just inside the blue-line. MacLeod let fly a hard shot that the Saints goalie stopped but Ready was waiting at the side for the rebound.

Claude Peters scored the Saints first tally when his shot

Canadian Wins The First World Alpine Ch'ship

BAD GASTEIN, Austria (CP)—Lucille Wheeler outskied Europe's best Thursday to win the women's downhill race and give Canada its first world alpine championship.

The pretty 23-year-old blonde from St. Jovite, Que., raced the 7,872-foot downhill run on Graukogel mountain in 2:12.1. The course over soft and yielding snow was considered so difficult that it could be used for men's competition.

Twenty-seven control gates were needed to guide the girls away from trouble.

Miss Wheeler edged out Frieda Daenzer of Switzerland, who finished in 2:12.4, and Carla Marchelli of Italy, timed in 2:12.5.

NEARLY MISSED GATE
"I can't believe it," Miss Wheeler said when her time was announced. "I almost missed a gate up there in the run and I had to make an extra turn to get through it. My skis had just the right touch for this snow. I am so very happy."

Anne Heggtveit of Ottawa placed seventh in the field of 42 in 2:16.3.

The combined placing in the top 10 came as a surprise as the Austrian girls had been expected to dominate the competition.

Miss Daenzer was narrowly ahead in the combined championship, awarded to the best overall performer, after two events—the slalom and downhill. Putzi Frandl of Austria was second, Miss Wheeler third, Astrid Sandvik of Norway fourth and Suzanne Thilliere-Guriam of France, fifth.

DECIDE TITLE SATURDAY
The girls' combined title will be decided Saturday when the giant slalom is held.

Miss Heggtveit's performance was her best in four years. Her career was set back in 1955 when she fractured an ankle while practising slalom runs at Mont Tremblant, Que. Ski fans now think she may be recovering the form

shown in her victory at the Holmenkollen giant slalom in Norway in 1954.

There was no competition in the men's division Thursday. Austria's Toni Sailer leads after two events. The decision in the men's combined rating will be made Sunday when the championships end with the men's downhill.

Ted Williams Salary Is Estimated At \$135,000

Boston (AP)—Ted Williams Thursday signed what undoubtedly is baseball's best playing contract, his 18th agreement to play for Boston Red Sox. Estimates of his 1958 salary range to \$135,000.

Williams, amiable as your best friend and appearing several years younger than the 40 mark he'll reach in August, chatted with reporters for more than an hour.

Williams had spent that much time in conference with Joe Cronin, Boston general manager, before his signing was announced. Said Cronin:

"It gives me pleasure to announce that Ted has signed with a raise which is deserved. . . . It's easier to deal with a 383 hitter (Ted's 1957 average) than any other kind of a ball player. If you fellows were as good financiers as he is you'd all be better baseball writers."

BIGGEST DEAL EVER?
Asked whether the contract was the biggest ever in baseball, Cronin gave the customary: "We never divulge figures."

Williams, who has often clashed verbally with reporters, delivered these opinions in a gracious manner:

"I don't feel any different than I did 10 years ago. No, I didn't say that I think I can go on indefinitely. I wouldn't set a date when I might quit playing. I say I feel wonderful and feel I can do anything I could do five years ago. I'll play just as long as I can."

"Yes, I'm happy about my contract. About first base?"

"I don't know about first base—I wouldn't look good in it. If five years ago I knew I'd still be around I might have tried it. But a lot of good players have

tried it and haven't been able to do it.

"My strength (to the club) is offensive. I admit I don't make some plays in the field but I don't think I let in too many runs."
