Tenders for Steamship Lines.

TENDERS will be received at the Finance Department, Ottawa, up to and including the 1st day of May next, from persons or companies for the performance of the following steamship services, viz.:
1st. A line of mail steamers sailing from Halifax to Havana, thence to Kingston, thence to Santiago de Cuba, thence to Canada; and (2nd) a line of mail steamers between Canada and Porto Rico and adjacent islands. Tenders to be made by each line fortnightly. Steamers to be of a size sufficient to carry 2,000 tons of cargo and to be able to steam twelve knots an hour, averaging not less than eleven knots an hour. An Islander Abroad.
GUNNISON AND GOTHIC CITY CRITICISED—AN INTERESTING LETTER.

The following is another extract from the racy letters of a successful young Islander abroad, this one being written from Gunnison:
"I arrived in this hitherto unexplored region of desolation a few days ago, in fair order and condition. The walking is not very good just now, so I came in a Pullman freight car, over the somewhat famous scenic route of the Denver and Rio Grande railroad. I passed by Pike's Peak on the fly, getting but a faint squint at the 'tall sentinel of the Rockies' from the rear platform. Its grandeur lies in the imagination of the gazer, I think; it's nothing to 'go wild over' at any rate. I stopped at Pueblo two days, to interview the aboriginal and unwashed 'grasser.' The Mexican House is not a very stylish one—it looks a good deal like an Island pig-pen. I don't think a Digger Indian would live in an adobe hut. The dirty, worthless Pueblo Mexican is too lazy even to die. He looks like a cross between a nigger and a Chinaman, and he has all the bad qualities and none of the good of both. He hangs on to his traditions and language with great pertinacity. Sleepy old Pueblo. It has seen many changes in the 250 years of its existence. The followers of Cortez and Montezuma are being crowded out by a superior race; but Pueblo is not a very enjoyable city to live in. It is a nine hour ride between Gunnison and Pueblo, the route leading through the grand cañon of the Arkansas and over Marshall Pass. The latter place is two miles above sea level, and the view obtained from the summit is magnificent. The train winding its way up the steep mountain side—up a grade of 225 feet to the mile—is a curiosity worth seeing. Often the train passes and re-passes on the same mountain side, and looking down you can see four tracks, one above the other. And now we come to Gunnison City. Its attractions have been dimmed into my ears for years past. All other towns east and west faded into insignificance when mentioned alongside that of Gunnison. The guide-book (so-called) of Gunnison places it on a par with Paradise. As a matter of fact, the one hotel it contains is the only decent building in town. The railroad almost ignores its existence, and only one—the D. & R. G.—runs through it. Gunnison's greatness has departed. There is not another town in the whole Republic that can show such a falling off in its population. Five years ago it was a city of 10,000 people; to-day it has scarcely 1500. All that remains of the grandeur of yore is its mushroom shanties and the hills that surround it. Those who remain are too lazy to leave or are unable to raise enough to get away. Its tenantless houses, which a stranger can count by the score, and the tumble-down stores, which are strewn in hopeless confusion under the shadow of the Rockies, remain to remind the coming generations of the great rush of the anxious-to-be-rich-in-a-hurry mob to this region a few years ago. This is the prospector's headquarters. Judging by his gaudy looks, he is, to paraphrase a Scriptural quotation, 'seeking gold and finding none.' The surrounding hills within a radius of a hundred miles are 'filled full (to use an Irish bull) of holes,' which represent many patient months of weary work. With a faith akin to saintliness of the ultimate success of his work, and a sanguine feeling that fortune is only a few feet deeper, the toiling seeker for wealth delves deeper and deeper into the solid rock, and then he goes back to the city—perhaps to put in the winter, or make more money to keep him in grub while off on another prospecting tour. And this in the face of the fact that there are very few mines in Gunnison County that pay. Silver Cliff and other towns of great mining repute in days gone by are dead as door nails. The old settlers have left this part of the country. They have gone further up on the range. There is plenty of one-silver and lead—in the hills—but not in paying quantities. Snow covers the face of the earth in this locality, and nothing but sleighs and snow shoes are serviceable. It would break the heart of a Mic-Mac Indian to see a native of the mountains on snow shoes. He is as proficient as any Canadian in their use, and races are gotten up between opposing clubs, which afford about the only kind of amusement to be had on the lofty range. Gothic City, where J. H. Fletcher is said to have made his wealth, is only about 20 miles from here. They have one good paying silver mine there, the 'Silver Night.' I would go up there but there is a terrible pile of snow on the mountains just now, and the mine is closed up for the winter. It is said to be a very prettily situated town of perhaps 500 people in summer and perhaps 10 or 20 people in winter when the mines close down. Next week I shall take in Buena Vista and Leadville, the latter place I am anxious to see on account of the stories of fabulous wealth connected with it and locality. Perhaps then I shall be able to tell you all about California Gulch and Tennessee Pass. I will run up to Breckenridge from there and then back to Denver."

Mr. Foster on the Prohibition Question.

An Ottawa despatch states that Mr. Foster has been interviewed on the prohibition question. In reply to an interrogation he said: "The temperance question has not been discussed by the Government. As for myself, of course I am an out-and-out prohibitionist. The issue is being more seriously considered each successive year, and in the nature of things must ere long become a dominant question in the Dominion. I am in favor of every legislative measure which will tend to diminish the sale and use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and in favor of this enactment whenever there is reasonable ground for believing that the public sentiment will sustain its enforcement. All license laws are partial prohibition laws, and every advance made in strictness of legislation is a nearer approach to complete prohibition. There are large portions of Canada which are at present, I believe, fully ripe for complete prohibition. There are other large sections of which I do not think the time can be said. Press as strongly as temperance people may for a prohibitory law, they will get it only when the majority of the people's representatives are in favor of its enactment. Whenever that time comes we may fairly conclude that the majority of the people want prohibition and that the country will be ripe for it. With regard to the Scott Act, looking in both directions, namely, in the direction of a strengthening of the Act by making its provisions more strict, and in the other direction of weakening the Act by extending it to admit of the sale of fine wines and beer, it cannot be predicted what will be the outcome, inasmuch as a large number of members of Parliament are new and have not yet made their Parliamentary record on the question."

The Canadian Navy.

The department of Marine and Fisheries has given orders to the commanders of the fishery protection cruisers to be ready for sea by the 15th of April, when the following vessels will commence to patrol the fishing grounds:—
Steamer La Canadienne, 3 officers and 18 men.
Steamer Lansdowne, 3 officers and 24 men.
Steamer Acadia, 3 officers and 18 men.
Each of the above to carry 3 guns.
Schr. Gen. Middleton, 90 tons, 3 officers, 12 men.
Schr. L. Houlett, 80 tons, 3 officers and 12 men.
Schr. F. E. Conrad, 75 tons, 3 officers and 12 men.
Schr. Terraz, 65 tons, 3 officers and 12 men.
Schr. Lizzie Lindley, 74 tons, 3 officers and 12 men.
Schr. Critic, 75 tons, 3 officers and 12 men.
Schr. Vigilant, 80 tons, 3 officers and 12 men.

On the 15th of May the following vessels will be added to the fleet, and if necessary, others will be added during the season:—
Schr. Dauntless, 90 tons, 3 officers and 12 men.
Schr. Hannah 82 tons, 3 officers and 12 men.
Schr. Embury, 75 tons, 3 officers and 12 men.

Each schooner is to be armed with one gun.

A Fact for Teetotalers.

There is one patent fact with which teetotalers, even when they are, like those who lately attended the Egyptian Hall, men of comparative education never will deal, and this is that nearly half the semi-civilized world is rigidly teetotal. As a people, the natives of India not only do not get drunk, but look upon the mere tasting of liquor with a fanatical abhorrence; yet the average of crime among them is at least as high as in England, infinitely higher than in Ireland where men drink hard. The Turkish soldiery, who never drink, are capable of any crimes; and all the outrages of the mutiny were committed by men who would gladly punish drunkenness with death.
