MR. CARON AT TIGNISH

Large and Influential Meeting.

A Speech of Four Hours Duration!

Mr. Perry Presents A Vote of Thanks.

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

ALBERTON, August 22.

A large and influential meeting was held at Tignish on Saturday. Many were unable to obtain admittance to the Hall, which was densely crowded.

Mr. Caron addressed the meeting for four hours in French and in English.

Hon. S. F. Perry moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Caron at the conclusion of the meeting.

Three cheers were given for the Queen and three for the Minister of Militia.

Mr. Caron was the guest of the Rev. Donald McDonald, and left this morning for Summerside.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 19.

A despatch from Victoria, B. C., says the town of Yale is in flames. Nearly all the business houses, three hotels, the jail, the Court House and residences have been destroyed. The fire broke out in the California Hotel, and swept everything before it.

LATER.—The fire has crossed the street. Openheimer's brick warehouse was the only fire-proof building in the town, and it is now in flames. The stock of goods is very heavy; insurance light. The loss will be great.

The fire was got under control at 8 o'clock last night. The ruin is most complete, and the loss variously estimated at from \$30,000 to \$40,000. All the best buildings, except the church and Hudson Bay Company's store, and the buildings and warehouse of the railway are gone. Only one hotel is left standing.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.

The President's pulse to-night is 106; temperature and respiration about normal. The house was cleared before 11 o'clock and the prospects are that the patient will pass a comfortable night.

The following was sent to-night:—

To Mr. Lowell, Minister, London:

In the judgement of his physicians, the President has gained since the last reports. He has taken during the day 22 ounces of liquid food with relish and without apparent tendency to nausea or indigestion. The symptoms have not essentially changed.

His pulse and temperature are a little better. The swelling of the parotid gland has not increased, and fear of its supuration has somewhat diminished. At this hour (11 p. m.) the President is sleeping quietly.

TOMBSTONE, Aug. 19.

An American just from Sonora states that about a week ago twenty-five Americans, supposed to be from San Simon, raided the vicinity of Baviopé and gathered up all the stock they could and started homeward. The Mexicans overtook them and a fight ensued. The Mexicans were defeated and eight were killed. General Otevo, at Feoteras, ordered Captain Carrillo with his company to the line where the raiders expected to cross. As the command had ridden day and night it is not improbable that the killing in Guadalupe Canon might have been done by Mexican Regulars under Carrillo.

LONDON, Aug. 19.

The News says the Home Rule members intend to raise a debate on the imprisonment of Michael Davitt, when the vote for convict prisons is taken.

Mr. Puleston, member of Parliament, gave a dinner at the Conservative Club, Wednesday, in honor of Hon. Wm. M. Ewart. Several other Americans were present.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 19.

A new treaty between Russia and China will be ratified to-day. The territorial boundaries are all agreed upon, and Russia receives an indemnity of 9,000,000 roubles in specie. The Russians are to be entitled to trade freely on both slopes of Thian Shan as far as the great wall, and a tariff is to be established. Other important concessions are to be granted to the Russians.
