

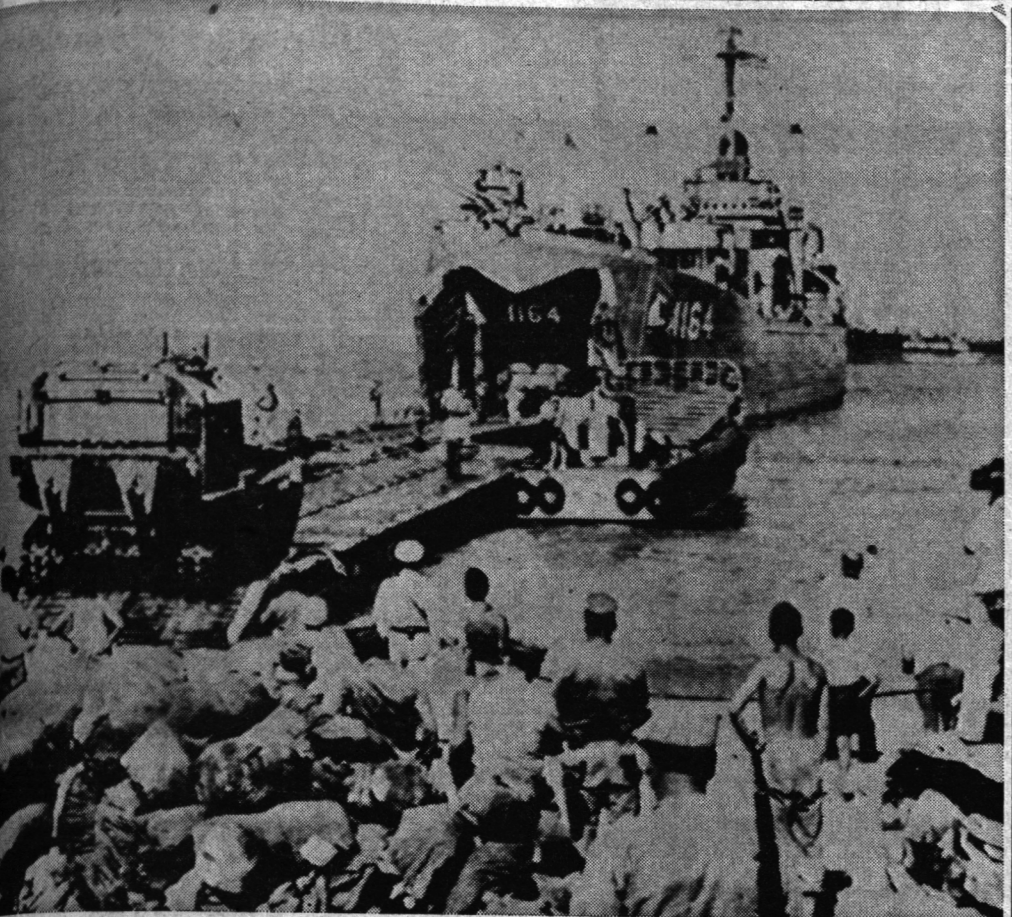

Ferry To Leave Halifax Today

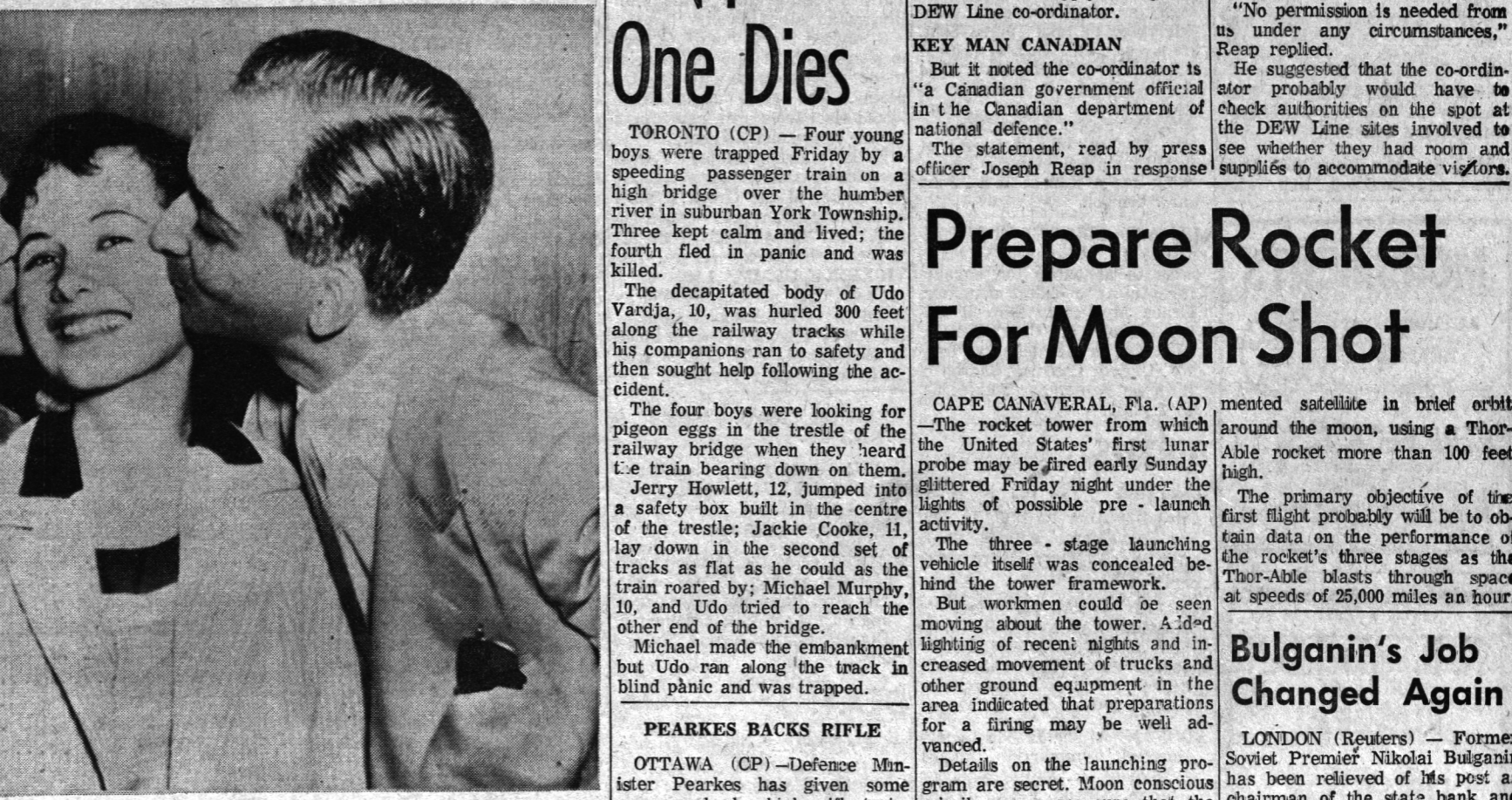
