Halifax Business Man Addresses Board Of Trade

F. Carl Hudson, president of Municipal Spraying and Con-

tracting Ltd., Bedford, N.S., and chairman of the Dalhousie Bureau of International Relations was the guest speaker at the quarterly dinner meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade held at the Charlottetown Hotel last night. His subject was "Labor Management Relations".

Mr. Hudson opened his remarks by stating, "You are to be congratulated on having appointed a P.E.I. Labor-Management Council to study labor relations problems. In these days of rapid change in technology, social welfare and automation, it is high time that we look carefully at our social organizations. All too many of us have fuzzy ideas about the role of some of these organizations."

"I suppose the most inflammatory word in the dictionary for most workers and managers is the word union", the dictionary defines a union, as a group or

association of people banded together for a common purpose. In these various associations we, and our families meet and work and play with people from all walks of life. But as soon as some of these people we know and work with become members of a union, that is another matter entirely. I submit the basic reason is fear. Also the workers who are striving for a union are also possessed by fear, fear that they will lose their jobs, fear of intimidation, discrimination, when promotions are being considered, or layoffs are made.

"Because the labor movement is still in its infancy here in Prince Edward Island, you have a unique opportunity to build together a responsible, productive and co-operative economy," Mr. Hudson added. "The opportunity is here, all you have to do is learn the basic concepts of industrial relations, so that you will be able to appreciate what the joint study committee will report to you from time to time and to build up their recommendations."

He pointed out that the field of industrial relations is a most intriguing one. "It calls for different techniques than those used in many other walks of life. It calls for a great measure of patience; it calls for a careful and painstaking search to seek out exactly what the other person means because so many of the terms and phrases used mean different things to different people."

The speaker went on to give a background of recent experiences in the labor relations field in Nova Scotia.

In closing he added, "we will follow your progress with the keenest interest, and look forward to your active participation in spreading the philosophy of mutual recognition and team work in creating a more prosperous Maritime economy."

The speaker was introduced by Rev. Malcolm McCuaig and thanked by J.J. Revell, chairman of the P.E.I. Labor Board.

C.W. Moffatt, general manager of the Charlottetown Board of Trade in his report stated that since the last quarterly meeting on September 29 a considerable number of projects in which the Board of Trade has been interested have been inaugurated, and went on to outline a number of them.

"This includes the recent establishment of the P.E.I. Labor-Management Relations Council by the Provincial government. The Board of Trade was honoured to have the government request an appointee to the Council and it was our pleasure to have Frank W. Curtis, a past president and a past councillor on the Board of Trade accept a seat on the Council."

COUNCIL APPROVES

He reported that Monday evening the Charlottetown City Council approved a Board of Trade recommendation to establish a Charlottetown Development Commission, to consist of two members of City Council, two appointees from the Board of Trade, and one member from the Town Planning Board and two members at large.

Mr. Moffatt pointed out that this commission will work from the Board of Trade office, with the administrative work being under his direction. It will succeed the Board of Trade Industrial Promotion Committee and will be authorized to take proper steps from time to time. To secure new industrial and commercial establishments within the municipal corporation of the City of Charlottetown and generally to give publicity to the advantage of the City for business and manufacturing purposes. To foster friendly employer-employee relations, to receive, acquire and hold gifts, donations, devices and banquets, and to do such other things conducive to the attainment of the above objects.

Welfare Director Addresses Meeting

SUMMERSIDE - Sister Mary Henry, Director of the Catholic Welfare Bureau in Charlottetown, told an assembly at the local Canadian Legion Home Monday night of the aims and problems of the Alcoholic Treatment Centre being established in Charlottetown.

She said it is hoped to open the centre in the renovated former St. Vincent's orphanage building on Monday and it is hoped that the Centre will be as homelike as possible for the 20 men it can accommodate.

The speaker said that aid has been obtained for the centre from the Federal and Provincial governments and from clubs and private citizens. It is hoped that the Centre will receive further assistance from the Canadian Assistance Plan.

Sister expressed her hope that similar centres will be eventually established in Summerside and Souris and that these will profit from the experiences of the Charlottetown Centre.

The Sister's talk was followed by a group discussion.

Wilson Reported Seeking New Concessions By Smith

LONDON (CP)—Prime Minister Wilson is seeking to wring further concessions from Rhodesian Premier Ian Smith under the threat of today's deadline for a British application to the United Nations for selective, mandatory sanctions against Rhodesia.

Wilson told the Commons Tuesday there has been "small movement" in Salisbury during the last few days but there would have to be a "good deal more movement yet" before a Rhodesian settlement could be reached.

The core of the dispute is the white-minority Smith regime's refusal to submit to Britain's demands that the Negro majority eventually get to rule in Rhodesia. It was over this issue that Smith seized independence last year.

While Sir Saville Garner, head of the diplomatic service, is in Washington and Ottawa consulting with U.S. and Canadian officials on how trade embargoes against Rhodesia can be tightened, Sir Morrice James, deputy head of the Commonwealth relations office, will wait in Salisbury, ready to consult if Smith shows signs of offering further compromise.

Officially, James is to seek further clarification of Smith's "minor concession" which Commonwealth Secretary Herbert Bowden brought back with him from the Rhodesian capital early Monday.
