

ELECTORS REMEMBER,

1. That during the Davies Administration, the Hon. Thomas Walker Dodd received from the Government over \$5,000, in payment for goods, every dollar of which was paid him in direct violation of law.

7. That the deficit showed by the accounts cooked by Davies & Co. is \$23,000, which added to the sum of \$36,891 as shown by Mr. Hyndman, makes the ACTUAL DEFICIT FOR 1878 NEARLY \$60,000.

8. That Mr. DesBrisay's memo. proves beyond controversy the truth of the revelation made in the EXAMINER the day before yesterday, that only THREE QUARTERS' TEACHERS SALARY WAS PAID IN 1878.

9. That everyone knows that if teachers are only paid 3 quarters' salary in one year, 5 quarters' pay will have to be provided in another.

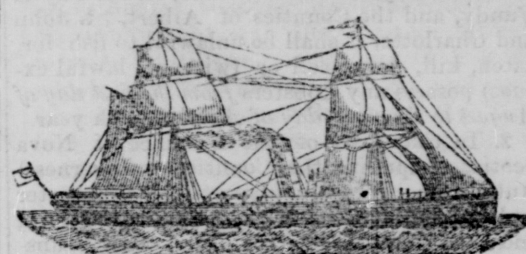
