Vice-President Speaks At Rotary

"More than 3,000 international contacts have been completed by the Rotary Club of New Glasgow, N.S." stated Hy Goodman, vice-president and director of the club's international service, who spoke at the regular luncheon meeting of the local club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Mr. Goodman discussed the various avenues open to Rotarians for international service. One such project was an exchange of recorded tapes between Canadian Rotary Clubs and those of other countries. He said, "one of my contacts in the southern U.S.A. had become one of his best friends through the use of tape recordings, even though they had never met."

Mr. Goodman told the luncheon that the New Glasgow Club had received banners from Rotary clubs in more than 180 different countries of the world.

Catch Of Cod Poor Off Nfld.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) - Fisheries Minister C. Max Lane said Monday the cod fishery throughout Newfoundland and Labrador was relatively poor this year and the department was "keeping an eye" on the situation, hoping for improvement in the fall catch.
He said the trap fishery failed, as it did last year, and the cod taken were "small, almost like tom cods." He felt the offshore catch of larger fish was the main reason the season hadn't proven even more disastrous so far.

Thant didn't at any time during his 45-minute conference rule out the possibility he will accept a second term. Although he said at one point that an improved political atmosphere wouldn't influence him, he modified this stand under persistent questioning.
"Such a situation might influence to some extent my decision, but not primarily or exclusively. As I have said, there are personal, political and official reasons for it. Some improvement in the political field might contribute to the necessity of my review of my decision."

Thant repeated his contention that the most serious current world problems can't be settled as long as China is excluded from the UN.
"I believe - very strongly that this organization must be universal and the sooner the better."

DISCUSSED REASONS
In discussing the considerations that caused him to say Sept. 1 that he had decided not to offer himself for a new term, Thant said:
"To be candid, I feel that I have found it increasingly difficult to function as secretary-general in the manner in which I wish to function, and secondly, I do not subscribe to the view that the secretary - general should be just a chief administrative officer, or, in other words, that the secretary-general should be a glorified clerk."

"I do not accept this concept of the secretary-general. As I have said repeatedly on previous occasions, besides the functions of the administration, the secretary-general must take the necessary initiatives in the political and diplomatic fields. These political and diplomatic initiatives, in my view, are an essential part of the functions of the secretary-general."
In discussing China, Thant said:
"I must say that Peking's statements from time to time indicate that Peking has ceased

Editors Voice Strong Opinions

Some very strong opinions were voiced by travel editors and writers representing some of the most important publications in the United States. Their comments came Sunday night while sitting around the dinner table at Lakeview Lodge, Cavendish, where they were guests of the P.E.I. Tourist Association.

The opinion which they all expressed read as follows:
"This Island has a charm all its own, a fascination that comes from its peacefulness and the relaxation of its people; but it will never be the same again

if you let them build the causeway."
Col. E.W. Johnstone, Burlington, president of the association, who presided, asked the writers and editors if they cared to express their opinions or give tourist operators ideas on what they should be offering visitors.

Without exception they deplored the changes in the character of the province which a causeway will bring and paid The Island its highest compliment when they agreed they would all love to come back for a vacation of their own and "find this lovely land the same as it is now."
Levitt Morris, travel editor of The Christian Science Monitor and a world traveller in his own right, said he realized the causeway was inevitable because "you cannot stop progress" but it will bring many unwelcome changes in its wake.

LARGE URBAN AREA
Both Carolyn Patterson, associate editor of the National Geographic Magazine, and Josie Wilson, travel editor of House and Garden, agreed the causeway would bring many more people to this province, but "they may not always be the people you want to come". Miss Wilson said the United States population was exploding and the Eastern Seaboard has now become just one large urban area.

As a result people are searching for new places and soon too many of them will find Prince Edward Island. She suggested there was a distinct difference between tourists and travellers. The former, she said, wanted everything done for them while the traveller expected to find things on the rough side because he was searching for something other than comfort. She thought the causeway would bring too many "trippers" whom she said were like window shoppers who buy nothing and spend nothing - just add to traffic congestion, but not to the economy.

Peter White, freelance travel writer, suggested Island tourist operators could make a fast dollar from the average tourist or make a steady income by taking a long range view of the industry and keeping the province as it is. Otherwise, he said, eventually "you will turn your Island over to them while you find a quiet peaceful place among the lakes in Ontario until you make the same mistake again up there."
