Crapaud-Victoria Board Of Trade Told Of Prov. Workshop

The Charlottetown Board of Trade has completed arrangements for holding a "Workshop" for all Provincial Boards of Trade on Saturday, November 24. Mr. Earl Taylor, President of the Charlottetown Board, announced last evening during his address at the annual banquet of the Crapaud-Victoria Board of Trade held at the Queen Hotel.

The workshop, to be held at the Charlottetown Hotel, was designed to bring together all Provincial Boards with a view primarily to discussing problems affecting the Province as a whole, and their consequent relation to the economic development of island municipalities and rural areas. He stated further that it was an ideal means of developing unity of ideas so that any representations being made by a representative group would embody the unanimous agreement of the Boards of Trade throughout the Province.

Most of the pictures showed places of historical interest. Places we had heard about in childhood were given a sense of reality, enlivened, and made effective, by Miss Lowe's ready flow of words and wit. The audience was taken to Blenheim, birthplace of Sir Winston Churchill, and shown the beautiful gardens there; Windsor Castle and the changing of the Guard; the King of Iraq in the State Coach during his visit to London; old churches, and the Shakespeare country - the theatre and the beautiful Avon river; old Roman ruins with odd and interesting bits of information; Stonehenge; the Roman baths; even an ancient lighthouse still in fair condition after 2,000 years of weathering storms.

School Radio Officials Meet

Educationalists and radio officials are meeting in Charlottetown to study the Atlantic School Broadcasts and plan for 1957-58. Dr. L.W. Shaw, Deputy Minister and Director of Education of P.E.I. is chairman of the Atlantic School Broadcasts Executive which meets Thursday and Friday at the Charlottetown Hotel in conjunction with the Curriculum Committee of the Atlantic Provinces. The object is to coordinate the broadcasts with other school work.

The Atlantic School Broadcast network presents 11 programs a week over 18 stations in the Atlantic Provinces. They range from Kindergarten to Senior High School.

Outlines Aims Of Welfare Bureau

At the weekly supper meeting of Centennial Y's Men Lloyd Grant and Neil MacLennan co-chaired with Arnold Calbeck, fine-masther and Claude Whitnack song leader.

The guest speaker of the evening was Mr. Walter Baker of the Protestant Welfare Bureau. Mr. Moncton, Brackley Point Road, North River Road, Millview, Mount Stewart, Tyron, and two from Charlottetown.

Also under the Traffic Act, fines of \$5, and costs were imposed on a Charlottetown resident for having defective equipment on his vehicle, and a Hunter River resident for allowing the illegal use of licence plates. Under the Temperance Act, fines of \$20, and costs were given to a Bedford resident for purchasing liquor on a permit other than his own, and a Charlottetown resident for having liquor in his possession at a place other than his residence.

Four Criminal Code cases were also presented. A Morell man charged with driving while impaired, was fined \$75, and costs. The cases of two Charlottetown residents, charged with theft of a motor vehicle, were adjourned until Monday next. Bail bonds of \$500, each were accepted. A Wood Islands resident appearing on a charge of indecent assault on a female was released on bail consisting of two \$500. sureties. The case was adjourned for one week. All three cases will be heard by a magistrate.
