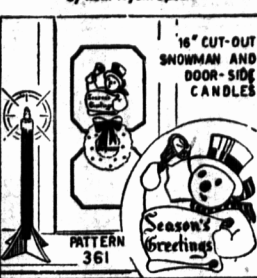


### Workshop Patterns

### Shipments Equal Last Year's

MONCTON, Christmas tree shipments from the Atlantic Provinces will be about the same as last year when some 3,000 carloads were shipped from Canadian National Railways' stations in Eastern Canada representing some nine million trees. Christmas tree exporters, when interviewed, said that the recent snowstorms had greatly interfered with the cut this season, otherwise it would have been a record year. Cutting will be about two weeks later than last year, usually it ends between December 5 and 10 but this year it will extend to around December 17. While the quantity will be about the same, the value will be about 15 per cent greater.

Last year the total value was estimated at around \$5,000,000. New Brunswick's share being \$2,000,000 and that of Nova Scotia \$3,000,000 which would make the total value for these two provinces this season in the vicinity of \$5,750,000. Shipments from Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland are practically negligible, these two provinces not participating in the Christmas tree trade to any great extent. Prince Edward Island has practically no forests while Newfoundland's distance from the markets and shipping difficulties mitigate against shipments from that Province. Canada supplies about one quarter of the Christmas trees in the United States, or out of every ten Christmas trees cut in Canada seven are shipped across the border.

Balsam fir is first choice, spruce comes next and then pine and cedar. Trees are usually shipped in bundles and in most demand are trees from 5 to 6 feet in height and in all lengths sawn butts are wanted.

The small Christmas tree, from one to three feet in length, has come into greater demand particularly among city apartment dwellers who usually buy through the supermarkets or grocery stores.

### French Olympic Skiers Have "Secret Weapon"

PARIS (AP)—France is going into the Winter Olympic Games with a "secret weapon" for its skiers—a specially-built ski with flexible metal rods through which the tension can be regulated.

Maurice Martel, president of the competition committee of the French Ski Federation, described the new ski Monday in an interview. He said its advantage is that it imparts a sensitive quality which can be adjusted for varying snow conditions.

The rods are built into the wood forward and behind the pivot point where the ski is attached to the foot. A small cylinder also is located at this point with springs running to the front and rear rods. Through maximum adjustment of the springs, the skis might be bent either upward or downward into small arcs.

### Sport Briefs

PARIS (Reuters)—The Grand Prix de Bordeaux auto race will not be run next year because of new French racing rules banning racing through populated areas, the French Automobile Club announced Monday. The safety rules were introduced after 81 persons were killed last June at the 24-hour Le Mans endurance race.

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy. (AP)—Entries arrived Monday for the complete lineup of 33 countries taking part in the 1956 Winter Olympics.

The formal deadline expired Dec. 1, but both Hungary and Argentina sent cables ahead to advise the organizers of their entries.

### BUTTER CLIMBS

OTTAWA (CP)—Creamery butter stocks rose in nine Canadian cities at Dec. 1 to 73,259,000 pounds from 65,177,000 in the corresponding period last year. The bureau of statistics reported Monday that butter stocks, with last year's figures in brackets, included Quebec 5,110,000 pounds (3,562,000); Montreal 36,355,000 (31,802,000).
