P.E.I. Presbytery Meets At Zion

The March meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island was held Tuesday in the Hall of Zion Church, Charlottetown, with the Moderator, The Rev. D. M. Carl Currie of Montague in the chair and the Clerk, The Rev. T.H.B. Somers, at the desk. The following were also present: Rev. D. A. Campbell, Rev. Donald Nicholson, Rev. J.D. MacKay, Rev. L.M. MacNaughton, Rev. E.H. Bean, and Rev. W.H. Brown, together with the following Elders: R.A. MacKenzie, Donald Campbell, Murdoch MacPhee, R.S.P. Jardine, E.A. Cudmore, Donald MacNevin, Boyd Bearisto, Earl MacInnis, Milton Fraser, A.A. MacSwain, and W.B. Simmons.

The Rev. D.A. Campbell presented to the Court a Call in favour of The Rev. Donald Nicholson to the Belfast Congregation. Five representatives spoke in support of the call and five representatives of Mr. Nicholson's congregation urged him to remain as their pastor. When asked to state his mind Mr. Nicholson requested time to consider and on motion of the Rev. T.H.B. Somers the Call was laid on the table and proceedings desisted until the May meeting of Presbytery.

A comprehensive review of the Canvassers' School held in Toronto in January was given by Rev. D.A. Campbell. For the secretaryship of the new committee on radio and visual aids, the court nominated the Rev. D. Ralph MacDonnell of Thorburn, N.S. To the forthcoming General Assembly in Toronto in June the following were appointed commissioners: Rev. M.C. Currie, Rev. J.D. MacKay, Mr. R.S.P. Jardine and Mr. T.A. MacKinnon.

Applications were approved for various appointments and grants to augmented charges and mission fields which will be presented to the Board of Missions at its meeting in Toronto this month.

Reporting for the Budget, Rev. L.M. MacNaughton stated that the Presbytery Church in Canada had reached and passed its goal of a million dollar budget for 1955. The increase in givings throughout the whole Church in 1955 was the largest in over thirty years and in this the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island had had a share. Presenting the Presbytery's Statistics for 1955, the Rev. T.H.B. Somers stated that despite the handicaps of so many vacancies in our pulpits the year 1955 showed increases in the number of elders, number of children in church schools, number of households, and number of communicants. Turning to financial returns the increases were exceptionally good showing positive advance in givings both for congregational purposes and the missionary and extra-parochial work of the Church at large.

GORDON MEMORIAL

Reporting on the Gordon Memorial at Alberton Rev. D.A. Campbell indicated that the work was now complete except for grading and fencing and recommended that plans be made for its dedication in July.

Reporting on Camp Keir, Rev. E.H. Bean presented a most satisfactory financial statement of the camp's operations in 1955 and announced new plans for the 1956 camps.

Arrangements were made for the induction of The Rev's. L.M. MacNaughton into the Tyne Valley Pastoral Charge on May 8th when the Rev. D.A. Campbell is to preach the sermon, Rev. E.H. Bean is to give the Charge to the Minister and the Rev. J. Donald Mackay the Charge to the Congregation. The next Stated Meeting of the Presbytery is to be held in the Church at Tyne Valley on May 8th at 2 p.m.

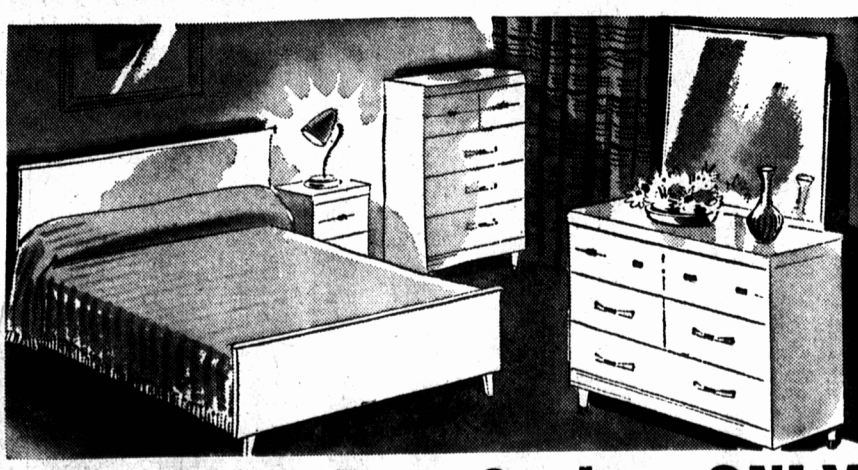

PRODUCTION RISE
OTTAWA (CP)— Production of pig iron and steel ingots rose sharply in February from the corresponding month last year, the bureau of statistics reported Wednesday. 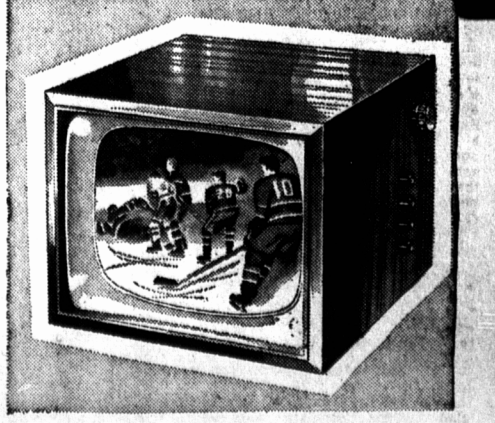
