Annual Meeting Bloomfield United

The annual meeting of the Bloomfield United Church was held in the Young Peoples Union room of the Church on Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 9th with the Minister, Rev. W. G. Dickson of O'Leary presiding. The minutes were read by the secretary-treasurer, Reginald F. MacAusland, and were approved.

The Sunday School report was presented by the Superintendent, Mr. John R. Dignan. There was an average attendance of twenty-five students divided into four classes. The teachers are Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Craswell, Mrs. R. F. MacAusland and Mr. J. R. Dignan.

The Young Peoples Union report was presented by Mrs. A. W. Craswell. They raised \$204.13 and spent \$194.14. They have a membership of twenty-one. They gave fifteen dollars to the Missionary and Maintenance Fund and spent \$138.25 on covering the cushions of the Church seats.

to a formal get-together of both sides during Mr. Churchill's five-day visit here following his Washington talks with President Truman.

Returning To Washington
Tonight, he made a major foreign-policy speech before a state dinner and planned to fly tomorrow morning back to Washington to address the United States Congress Thursday.

Cabinet discussions followed two previous informal meetings of the two groups. The first was at a dinner party Saturday night at Rideau Hall, where Mr. Churchill is staying with Governor-General Viscount Alexander; the second at a luncheon at Mr. St. Laurent's home Sunday. Informants said Mr. Churchill did not mention at today's meeting his reported move to give Viscount Alexander, his favorite general in the Second World War, a top Commonwealth defence post. This was taken to mean the post- Alexander hit already is decided. Meantime, it became increasingly clear that the Viscount, who holds the rank of field marshal, will become defence minister in the British Government, a portfolio Mr. Churchill himself now holds along with the prime ministership.

Second Major Development
A second major development from Mr. Churchill's visit also came into clearer focus today.

London dispatches said Gen. Sir Gerald Templer, who flew to Ottawa from the United Kingdom to confer with Mr. Churchill, is expected to be named within the next 48 hours as Britain's new chief in Malaya. At present chief of Britain's internal eastern command, he will have wide powers. Gen. Templer left Ottawa early tonight for Britain with Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, who joined the British party here Sunday. They fly from New York tomorrow.

With Mr. Churchill when he met the Canadian cabinet were Mr. Elin, Lord Ismay, his Commonwealth secretary, and Lord Cherwell, the British cabinet's atomic expert. Informed sources said Mr. Churchill did most of the talking and ranged the globe. He reviewed his Washington talks with Mr. Truman, occasionally referring to Mr. Eden and others in his party for some point.

No Requests For Aid
He asked the Canadians for nothing in the way of aid. Although he at times appeared to be heard of hearing, it was said that Mr. Churchill's mental grasp of the world situation acted as a stimulus to the gathering. His vigor pleased the Canadian cabinet.

The British ministers said later they were "very much heartened and encouraged" by the nature and tone of the discussions. They declined to comment further. Mr. Churchill is reported to have told the Canadians of plans he and Mr. Truman have developed to streamline the administrative machinery of the Atlantic Pact, a step which Canada long has favored.

Earle, Wilmot Valley, P. E. I.; A. Stephen North Carleton, P. E. I.; Horace E., Wilmot Valley, P. E. I., who resides on the homestead. Mrs. Huestis passed away Aug. 18th, 1926. Also one sister, Mrs. Bruce Taylor and one brother Charles, predeceased him and his parents have been dead for over thirty years. Despite his long life, the late Mr. Huestis enjoyed comparatively good health and up to the last few days of his life he enjoyed all his physical and mental faculties. For many years his children had regularly observed his natal day—August 17—and last summer at this annual birthday celebration, Mr. Huestis, enjoyed the fellowship and ice cream more than some of his children, for he was a lover of entertainment and friends. The funeral was held from his late residence, Wilmot Valley, P. E. I., on Dec. 14th, 1951 conducted by the Rev. W. A. Harper pastor of the Summerside Baptist Church, assisted by Rev. Wm.
