Imperial Institute.

LONDON, July 4. The Queen laid the foundation stone of the Imperial Institute building to-day, accompanied by the Prince and Princess of Wales, Duke of Teck, Duke of Hesse, Prince Henry of Battenburg, Duke and Duchess of Connaught and many other notable persons. Twenty thousand persons were present.

The Turkish Convention.

LONDON, July 4. Right Hon. Sir James Ferguson, Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign Office, announced in the Commons to-day that the Anglo-Turkish Convention in relation to Egypt had not yet been ratified by the Porte. He stated that England would grant no postponement of the convention by Turkey beyond to-day.

Royal Acknowledgment.

OTTAWA, July 4. His Excellency the Governor-General has received the following acknowledgment from Her Majesty to the loyal address passed by the Senate and Commons to the Queen on her Jubilee:—

"Accept for yourself and my Canadian people, expression of my warmest thanks for your kind congratulations." (Signed) VICTORIA.

The Rifle.

OTTAWA, July 4. The prize list at the approaching meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association this year will be increased about \$750. The conditions in many of the matches have been changed and there will be more Martini-Henry Rifle shooting than usual. The entrance fees will include cost of snider ammunition.

John Bright Writes Again.

LONDON, July 4. John Bright has written a letter in which he says Ireland is not neglected, but that the good measures in relation to that country passed since 1880 have been obstructed by a conspiracy deriving its funds and inspirations from American enemies.

Martial Law.

MADRID, July 4. Martial law has been proclaimed in Valencia, and 21 persons have been arrested for complicity in riot against the collector Octroi Fax, yesterday. Premier Sagasta to-day read the decree suspending session of cortes.

Aquatic.

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 4. The holiday regatta was well attended. In the single scull contest the order of winners was Hanlan, Hamm, O'Connor, Marigan and Courtney. Bubar and Enright did not complete the course.

Father McGlynn.

ROME, July 4. Orders have been sent to the Archbishop of New York to excommunicate Rev. Dr. McGlynn, and to publish the decree of excommunication in the journals.

EVANSVILLE, Mo., July 4. Henton Miller, treasurer of Perry County, is a defaulter to the amount of \$67,000. His whereabouts are unknown.
