NEWS NOTES.

San Francisco Japs have raised \$10,000 to help on the war.

Five miracles are reported from the shrine of St. Anne, near Quebec.

Americans are after English gold to complete the Nicaragua Canal. It will take \$80,000,000.

Four million seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars in gold were sent from New York to Europe on Saturday last.

Six hundred to a thousand persons arrive at Yarmouth every week from the United States by the Yarmouth Line of steamers.

The Yarmouth Line, which has a shrewd folk of that live Nova Scotia town, among them L. E. Baker, Robert Caie, W. L. Levitt, A. W. Eakins, S. A. Crossley, Hugh Cann, and John Levitt, spent \$75,000 in erecting the Grand Hotel, which was opened for business last week.

It is hoped and expected that this commodious hotel will be a favorite resort for the best class of travel in Nova Scotia.
