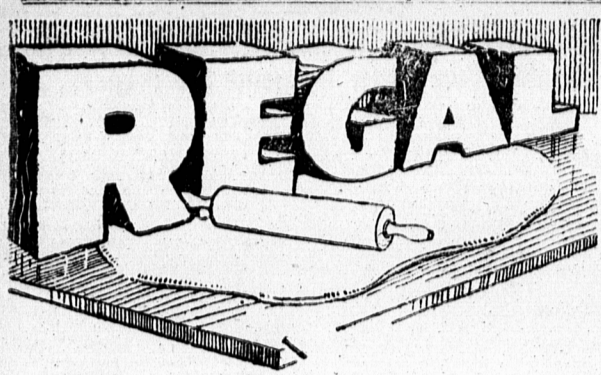

JOHN H. PATTERSON DIES ON A TRAIN

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 11.—John H. Patterson, founder and chairman of the board of directors of the National Cash Register company, Dayton, Ohio, died suddenly aboard a train bound for this city.

John H. Patterson was the main benefactor of the city of Dayton, where he built numerous modern homes for the employees of the National Cash Register Co. He built elaborate recreation rooms, gymnasiums, etc., and laid out beautiful athletic grounds and gardens. He made Dayton what has been called the most modern manufacturing city in the United States and was a leader in philanthropic and institutional work. He was a director in numerous companies and associations.
