**TREATMENT OF TOPERS.**—Topers in many of the towns of the Argentine Republic are shamed into reformation by being compelled to sweep the streets for eight days for each offence. Respectability is no excuse for leniency, and it is not a rare sight to behold a man in a dress suit toiling in the company of ragged tramps.

**CANADIAN EXPORTS.**—The returns furnished by the collector of the port of Montreal show that the exports of Canadian produce have fallen off during the month of January just past, as compared with the same month last year. The total of the exports, the produce of Canada, for the month just closed amounted to \$1,225,317, as compared with \$1,349,643 for January of last year. Exports not the produce of Canada, amounted to \$194,472 in January, 1899, as against \$184,785 for January, 1898.

**CONCERNING CREMATION.**—It is pointed out by an exchange that cremation seems to be the coming method of the disposal of the remains of the dead, if not from choice, then as a matter of necessity. The average annual death roll of London, Eng., is said to be 130,000. There are only about 200 acres burial land remaining within a reasonable distance of the metropolis. Under those circumstances London is face to face with a serious problem which is already being met by a movement to establish crematories all round the outskirts of London.

**OUTRAGEOUS LEGISLATION.**

VANCOUVER, Feb. 16.—"A gross outrage" is what the British Columbia press terms Attorney General Martin's latest move. Martin's motto, they say, is "power at any price." He is now engineering through the legislature, with a government majority of three, a bill the effect of which will be to disenfranchise all judges of the supreme and county courts, sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, employes of the provincial government, and marines, soldiers of the imperial service. This means that hundreds of conservative, anti-Martin, votes will be wiped out with one blow. Nearly all the judges are conservatives. Seventy-five per cent of the school teachers are conservatives. Ninety per cent of the provincial employes were appointed by the late Premier, Hon. Mr. Turner, and are all opposed to Martin rule.

**NICARAGUA CANAL.**

LONDON, Feb. 16.—"The Times" publishes a long explanatory historical article on the Nicaragua canal and the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, advocating compensation for the abrogation of the treaty, and declaring that "The Americans will think no less of us if we combine friendship with business." In an editorial echoing the foregoing ideas, the "Times" says: "Our treaty rights are undeniable and unassailable. We cannot be expected to surrender them gratis. On the other hand, we admit that while our interests in the canal scheme are large, America's are vital; and therefore as an act of friendliness, we ought to abrogate the treaty upon reasonable conditions which would not be in any way objectionable to the United States."

**General Booth's Birthday.**

LONDON, February 16.—The Salvation Army announces a monster celebration April 10 next, when General Booth will be 70 years old. They propose to raise \$350,000 by voluntary effort, to be used in army work. Seventy thousand new soldiers and recruits are to be added to the Salvation Army; 70,000 new junior and Band of love members to be added, 70,000 increase of the regular circulation of papers and magazines; 70,000 new officers, spiritual and social.

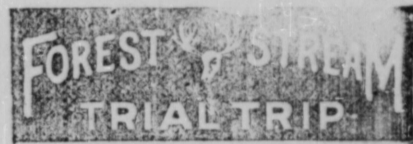
