Movements of the Fish.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau)

HAIFA, May 16.—The herring fishery is reported very good to-day at Perce and Grand River (Que.) but the fish are getting very scarce at Charlevoix on the north coast of New Brunswick and Alberton on the north of P. E. I.

LOBSTERS are not so plentiful at Perce, Que., but very good hauls are still being made at Grand River. The catch was only fair at Carraquet, N. B., but reported good at Shippegan. The fish are very plentiful on the north coast of P. E. I., from Mingiech round to Tignish, and a few are being taken at Alberton.

At Yarmouth, N. S., the cod and haddock fisheries are fair, and a few gasperaux, salmon and shad are being caught.

Telegraphic Ticks

MONTREAL, May 15.—Some excitement has been created here by the announcement made by a Quebec paper that the Pope has signified to Premier Mercier, while the latter was at the Vatican, his willingness to take up the \$10,000,000 loan required by the Province of Quebec.

LONDON, May 15.—Michael Davitt was interviewed to-day on board the steamship Polynesian, in Lough Foyle. He said his health was poorer than when he was released from Dartmoor prison.

PARIS, May 15.—Prof. Berheim in his report on transfusion of goat's blood for tuberculosis, says 14 patients have been treated, and two who were in the last stages of anæmia were cured.

BERLIN, May 15.—The Kreuz Zeitung to-day publishes an alarmist article on Russia's intrigues on the Danube, in which that paper declares that Russia has bought over all the officials of the Danubian steamship company, thus absorbing the whole Danubian trade, and has placed officials and pontoons at all strategic points on the river.

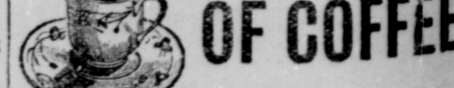
