Maritime Churches Of Christ Convention Opens

A hearty welcome was extended to all delegates to the Maritime Convention of the Churches of Christ which opened last night at the Central Christian Church here.

The ladies of the church had it beautifully decorated for the occasion with a profusion of cut flowers.

This morning's session will see an address on the convention theme "Emphasizing the Faith as it is in Jesus Christ" by one who is called "The Grand Old Man of Missions", Mr. W. E. Gordon, retired missionary of India who was born in that country and spent 50 years there.

Instead, the statement said, "Their Royal Highnesses hope their tour will enable them to see as many people as possible, and to be greeted by school children."

By Land, Sea, Air The royal couple will travel by land, sea and in the air.

Their home for much of the tour will be two specially-outfitted railways, cars used by the Governor-General when he is travelling.

In Canada's coastal waters on the east and west, they will use ships of the Royal Canadian Navy - the cruiser Ontario on the east and the destroyer Crusader on the west.

The ship, now on training cruises, will be refitted. On long hops in Canada and for their journey to Washington, they will fly in the R.C.A.F.'s C-54 transport aircraft used by Prime Minister St. Laurent and other high officials.

The royal couple will sail from Liverpool, Sept. 25 aboard the liner Empress of France. They will land the morning of Tuesday, Oct. 4, at Quebec, where the King and Queen first set foot on Canadian soil in 1939.

Resolutions Adopted At Teachers' Conference

Resolutions of interest to teachers across Canada were passed yesterday at the third general session of the 30th Conference of the Canadian Teachers Federation.

Recognizing that superannuation provisions are secondary only to salary and security of tenure, the conference recommended that the C.T.F. office serve as a clearing house through which Provincial teacher organizations can submit all proposals regarding superannuation.

Because there are many superannuation problems common to all Provinces it is proposed to set up a standing committee to deal with the problem through more frequent meetings.

The meeting also decided that Provincial affiliates sending a member to the Advisory Research Committee be asked to bear travelling expenses for the first meeting with such expenses to be pooled. The hotel and meal expenses while at the meeting will be borne by the Canadian Teachers Federation.

Income Taxes Income taxes came in for brief mention when it was agreed to make representations to the proper authorities requesting that expenses incurred by teachers in attending Summer School courses, which in some cases are compulsory, be deductible from taxable income.

The Federation also went on record as favoring a continuance of its efforts toward the establishment of a Canadian teaching certificate of a sufficiently high professional standing as to be acceptable to all Provincial Teachers' organizations.
