MOUNT CARMEL CHURCH.

THE KILLING OF WILLIAM PROUD.

Preliminary Investigation Resumed.

(From yesterday's second edition.)

The investigation was resumed at 2.15 p. m.

George Rodd (sworn)—I was in Charlottetown on Monday and met William Proud at the Railway Station when he came in on the train. We went up town, met his brother Peter and went to Mrs. Phelan's. After that we parted and met again at half-past five when Carr and William Proud were swapping horses.

Robert F. DeBlouis (sworn)—I left town at 6.35 that evening. At the corner of Spring Park Road I saw a large crowd opposite Thorne's. It seemed to me to be a general scuffle from where I was.

Annie Garrick (sworn)—I live nearly opposite Thorne's. Between 6 and 7 o'clock I saw the carriage opposite Thorne's. I saw John Trainor take his coat off. After that he and Hughes got into the carriage.

Phoebe Reid (sworn)—I live opposite Thorne's. I saw the carriage opposite my front door. I saw Trainor hit Peter Proud. I saw George Thorne afterwards in the crowd strike, but could not tell who he struck.

Mrs. Reid (sworn)—I saw Wm. Proud fall. There were lots of blows struck, but I could not tell by whom owing to the crowd.

Louis Pigott (sworn)—I live on Stewart Street. I saw the row opposite Thorne's house. I saw Peter Proud, George Rodd, John Trainor, John Hughes and a man on horseback. Saw Hughes and Trainor get into Proud's wagon, drive off a short distance and Proud go after them and bring back the wagon to Thorne's.

hit John Trainor. Edward Hughes was there, but I did not see him do any hitting. When Thorne hit him I did not see him fall. I was a piece away at the time. The next I saw was Wm Proud in the wagon hanging over the wheel.

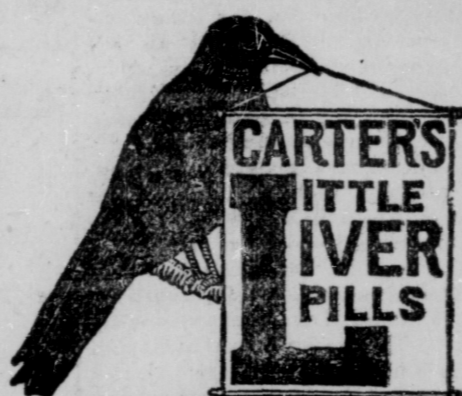
Patrick McClosky (sworn) I live at Lot 30. Am not acquainted with any of the prisoners but saw the fight. The Prouds were beaten freely. I saw one of them fall—the one that was killed I think. I was in my wagon. I saw one pretty large fellow give a blow to Proud on the side of the neck—he came up behind Proud. I don't see him here. I never saw any of the party before. I was about twenty yards away. To the best of my knowledge the man I saw strike the blow is not here among the prisoners.

Thomas McClosky (sworn)—Said that he did not know the Prouds nor any of the prisoners. I saw the Prouds in the fight but could not see whom they were fighting with because of the crowd around. There was a lot of hitting going on. Pretty heavy blows. I saw Proud fall.

The Attorney General here asked His Honor to discharge Daniel Carrol, which was granted.

Daniel Carrol (sworn)—I was on the Spring Park Road during the fight. I saw the wagon stop in front of Thorne's. When I got up to Thorne's the first fight was over and the wagon had started off towards Carr's but came back right away, and stopped in front of Thorne's. I was standing at the corner of Thorne's house near the carriage. The two Prouds and George Rodd were in the carriage. They all got out and came up to the house. Wm Proud came over to me, he knew me well and he said "who hit me." He was bleeding I told him, "I did not know William, I was not here, you had better get into your wagon and go home."

The case will be resumed on Monday next at ten o'clock.

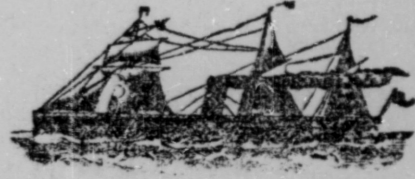

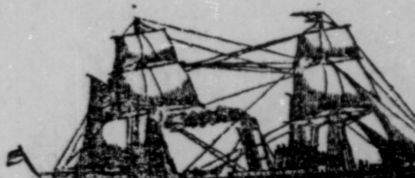
