The religious aspects involved and the dependence on God of those belonging to Alcoholics Anonymous were stressed last night by a priest and minister as they spoke at the fourth anniversary of the opening of the A.A. Rooms on Fitzroy Street.

Safety Urged At C.N.R. Meeting Last Evening

"We want to have safety minded families, not only among the employees of the Canadian National Railways, but across the whole nation," said Mr. R.B. Graham, General Superintendent, Moncton, in a brief but stirring address at the Clover Club last evening.

Mr. Graham was speaking to more than 300 C.N.R. employees, their wives, children and friends in the first of a series of meetings which have for their objective the broadening influence of Railway Safety methods, into the home.

"The factor of Public Safety and accident prevention is daily increasing in importance," said the speaker, "due chiefly to the stepped-up tempo of modern living."

He stressed the importance of continued and constant alertness on the part of railway men while on the job and drew a grim picture of the results in physical suffering, mental anguish and loss of earning power when one is a victim of an accident. "Accidents are caused, they do not happen," said Mr. Graham, and it behooves all of us to keep this fact in mind and make it known at every opportunity.

Seed Treatment For Potato Wilt

Seed treatment is beneficial in the control of Verticillium wilt in the varieties Irish Cobbler, Sebago, Chippewa and Kennebec, but is of lesser value in the varieties Green Mountain, Pontiac, Keswick and Katahdin, reports Mr. L. C. Calbeck, Laboratory of Plant Pathology.

"The seed should be treated while, care being taken to follow the directions supplied by the manufacturer of the chemical used. Mercury compounds, such as Semesan Bel, give best results. Following the treatment it is wise to spread the seed out on the barn floor to dry. Mercury compounds are poisonous and care must be taken that animals and humans do not consume treated tubers.

"Different varieties of seed potatoes should not be planted in the same field for if one variety fails to pass inspection the inspector must refuse certification of the other varieties as well. Growers are advised that in order to avoid such a disappointment, the following regulation should be noted: No potatoes shall be certified that are produced within two hundred feet of another potato field in which there is more disease than is permitted in the standards for 'Certified' seed potatoes."

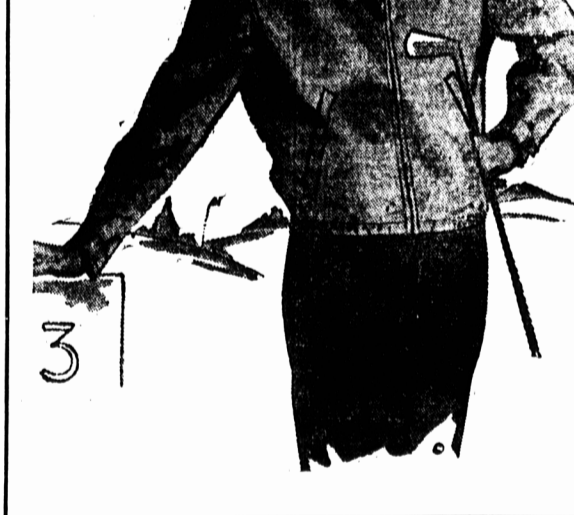
