

Death of Mr. M McCormack.

A cloud of profound sorrow darkened the happy home of Mr Michael McCormack, a much respected resident of St-Anthony, as the angel of death entered bearing the sad intelligence that his earthly career was over. The deceased, who had been in delicate health for some time previous to his death, was seized with a violent attack of congestion of the lungs.
