## Souris River Farmer Hurt

**SOURIS** — A Souris River farmer, Bernard Hughes, was injured yesterday when a tractor ran over him at his farm.

Mr. Hughes, who is about 70 years of age, is reported to have been driving the tractor and alighted to open a barn door. However, the tractor continued to move and when he attempted to remount, he tripped and fell and one of the heavy wheels

passed over his chest. He was taken at first to the Souris Hospital and later by Perry's ambulance to the Charlottetown Hospital where he is now a patient.

The accident occurred about 8:30 yesterday afternoon.

## Souris H & S Uses New Technique

**SOURIS** — The Souris and Regional Home and School Association successfully experimented with a new discussion group technique at the March meeting. A new idea instituted for discussion groups by the program committee was well received.

Unknown to each group, special speakers had been previously contacted to speak on each particular subject under discussion and at the conclusion of the recorder's report very interesting opinions were received.

Special speakers for the evening were Alfred Morrison, principal, and Sister St. Elaine of the SRS who spoke on "School Dropouts" and "Parental Interest"; Rev. E. Adams — "The Social Needs of the Child"; B.L. Stewart — "Better Housing and developing leadership as related to the community".

Considerable discussion centered on safety of the children going to and from school while the streets were banked high with snow. It was decided to ask the RCMP to visit the school and caution the students on safety.

The primary class of Souris Elementary again won the attendance shield.

Convicted of assaulting John Dalton, Georgetown, Leslie Doughty, Georgetown, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days. A fine of \$25 and costs or 10 days was imposed upon Everett James William MacLean, Georgetown, convicted of creating a disturbance in a public place by using obscene language, while for a similar offence, John Charles Martell, Georgetown, was fined \$30 and costs or 10 days.

Arraigned on two separate counts of driving while his operator's licence was cancelled, Birt Joseph Leard, Peakes Station, was fined \$30 and costs on each count.

For failing to register their motor vehicles, John Joseph Bouchard, Georgetown, Eugene Arnold Mallally, Montague, and John Graham MacDonald, Brudenell, were each fined \$10 and costs or five days.

A similar penalty was imposed upon Ronald Cameron, Charlottetown, charged with driving without due care and attention. David Joseph Laybolt, West St. Peters, was assessed a similar fine for driving without an operator's licence.

On two charges, one of operating a motor vehicle with defective equipment and the other of failing to transfer the registration of a motor vehicle, Emmanuel John Sanderson, Cardigan, was fined \$10 and costs or five days on each count.

Two others accused for being intoxicated in a public place, were each fined \$30 and costs or 10 days.

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
