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# Nichols Plays Brilliantly To Capture Top Position

**CHARLOTTETOWN (CP)—Young Bobby Nichols, wielding a bargain basement putter as if it were a magic wand, soared into the first round lead of the 46th PGA Golf Championship with a record six-under-par 64 Thursday, but he could not escape the shadow of that awesome teenage crack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer.**

**The 21-year-old club professional, playing before a worshipping home gallery, bounded back from bogeys on two of the first three holes for a 67 which threw him, into a second place tie with Mike Souchock, the massive ex-footballer from Duke.**

**Palmer, the game's greatest all-time money winner, started one of his late charges for a 68 which bracketed him with half-dozen others, including former champion Bill Casper and 1953 champion Ben Crenshaw of New Zealand.**

**The rain-soaked Columbus Country Club course and its par 35-36 took a murderous beating from the game's leading professionals, and Palmer warned.**

**"This is just the beginning. There will be more 64s and 65s here better before the week is over," the tournament ends today.**

**FAIRWAYS DRENCHED**  
**The fairways were so spotty, 6,531 yard courses were drenched from overnight rains that the players could not see their own feet as they stepped. The players could go only for the pins—and did.**

**Palmer, who was out for 10 hours, was the only player to finish the round in under par. He was tied for 69 under par, one over par. A driving rain, which has been in force for four in five years, has been in force for four in five years.**
