2,500 Telephone Poles On Trunk Lines Destroyed

2,500 telephone poles carrying long distance lines in the area between Charlottetown and Tignish were destroyed in the recent three-day sleet storm according to a count completed Friday by Telephone Company officials; this does not include poles which carry local or rural exchange lines.

A check of poles in the New London district revealed that 140 poles carrying long distance lines will have to be replaced in this area alone.

FROM MAINLAND
Seven crews have been brought in from outside the Province to assist local telephone linemen in the reconstruction of broken lines. Each crew consists of about six men and each crew is equipped with a truck and sufficient equipment to operate independent of each other.

The administrative staff at the Summerside office has been augmented by several specialists who have been brought in to direct reconstruction operations from the headquarters established in the telephone building in Summerside. These include A. H. MacKinnon, Superintendent of Construction for the Maritimes; C. R. ... th, Construction Supervisor for the Halifax area; Nelson Braid, Construction Headquarters Supervisor in Halifax; Mitchell MacDonald, District Plant Clerk, Halifax area; Merritt Grantmyre, storeskeeper for Maritime Telephone and Telegraph, Halifax District; Harold Receptor, Plant Clerk, Charlottetown; Walter Auld, Maintenance Supervisor, Charlottetown; Miss Edith Smith, Office Staff, Charlottetown. The Maintenance Foreman at the Summerside office is Earl Smith of Summerside.

Friday two temporary circuits were operating between Charlottetown and Summerside, and were being used to pass emergency traffic only.

Two circuits were also placed in operation from Summerside to the radio link at Urbanville by which it is hoped to restore communication with Moncton.

Twelve cars of poles are being brought in from New Brunswick for use by the telephone company and are expected to take care of the situation for the time being. Lines in the Charlottetown-Hunter River area escaped serious damage and communication between these two points has been fully restored.

Power Restored To Central Area Of Alberton

Electric light and power has been restored to Main Street in Alberton and to a number of homes in the central part of the town where it was not necessary to re-locate the power lines. Mr. Thomas Phillips, Alberton representative of the Maritime Electric Company, estimated that slightly over sixty homes and places of business were reconnected by Thursday night, including the new High School where classes will be recommenced at once.

Linesmen worked under most unfavorable weather conditions ever since the storm.

The continued thaw and rain of the past seven days is causing serious flooding of basements in west Prince County, especially in the O'Leary region, adding considerably to the hardships caused by the recent loss of power and heating facilities. Many fields near O'Leary are flooded under several feet of water.

Emergency generating units for O'Leary and Tignish have not yet arrived but some work has been completed toward line clearing and salvaging of transformers and equipment.

Three Carloads Of Power Poles Enroute To S'ide

Three additional linemen joined those already rebuilding lines for the Summerside Electric Light Department, and more linemen are being sought.

Working in crews of eight to ten men, approximately one hundred laborers and linemen are steadily restoring services, although it may be many days before services are fully restored to all sections of the town.

A big shipment of wire arrived by transport Friday morning, and more will be brought in as soon as possible. Three carloads of poles are already enroute to Summerside for use by the Electric Light Department, and the number of other cars will be shipped shortly.
