The Quebec Elections.

MONTREAL, June 17.

The general elections which took place throughout the Province to-day resulted in the Mercier Government being handsomely sustained, although Attorney-General Turcotte was defeated in Three Rivers. The Conservatives met with serious losses. Hon. Mr. Taillon, leader of the opposition, was defeated in Jacques Cartier by 127 votes by Hon. A. Boyer; and Hon. George Desjardines, the great financial critic of the opposition, was defeated in Montmorency by Charles Langslier, ex-M. P. Joseph Tasse, of La Minerve, was elected in Beauharnois by six majority; and Lessard, of Le Monde, redeemed Maskinonge. The Montreal city seats went government, except No. 3, where Alderman Glendinning defeated George W. Stephens by 21 votes. Alderman Villeneuve also carried Hochelaga by 400 votes.

A New Yacht.

HALIFAX, June 17.

The new yacht *Uvira*, built at Fay's Yard, Southampton, for James Fraser, of this city, arrived this morning, in command of Capt. Ross, making the passage in 26 days. Capt. Ross speaks very highly of her speed and sea-going qualities. The *Uvira* is a forty-two-footer, built from designs of Watson, of Scotland, the designer of the *Thistle*, which sailed for the America's cup.

To Leave the "Mail."
