Interesting History Of M. P. B. T. Is Recalled

The Maritime Provinces Board of Trade had its origin in 1896. In October of that year, a joint effort by the Councils of the Halifax and Saint John Boards of Trade brought about the formation of what was then known as the Maritime Boards of Trade. The organization was known as such until 1950 when, with the entry of the Newfoundland Board of Trade, the title was changed to include the word "Provinces" and embrace all four Maritime Provinces. The first president was the late A. M. Ben of Halifax and the group consisted of ten affiliated Boards from the three original Maritime Provinces. These ten were Halifax, Saint John, Charlottetown, Amherst, Fredericton, Moncton, Sydney, Kentville, Truro and Yarmouth. The presidency rotates each year by Provinces and until this year the secretaryship was a voluntary office filled by representatives of the Halifax and Saint John Boards—the founding Boards. In January of this year, however, there was brought into being an integration of the functions of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and the M.P.B.T., which has since come into effect in other parts of Canada. Under this integration program, the Canadian Chamber has established regional offices across the country which is incorporated secretariats for the regional organizations. The Chamber provides, maintains and staffs these joint offices and the services of its regional managers are at the disposal of the local bodies as executive secretaries. In the case of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade there is now a permanent secretariat located in Moncton, N.B., with A. T. Parkes as executive secretary. This allows for permanency and continuity in all activities of the Maritime organization. Further, with the establishment of the joint regional office and secretariat, the Canadian Chamber and M.P.B.T. are now in closer liaison with member Boards and better able to service and cater to requirements and requests of individual members. The office will act as a clearing house and focal point for information, material and other items to assist in carrying out local activities. It means, too, that member Boards

of both the Canadian Chamber and the M.P.B.T. now have the machinery to make known their views and wishes at both Federal and Provincial Government levels. Since the opening of the secretariat, M.P.B.T. Committees have been able to function more efficiently and actively on behalf of members. Notable among these committees is the Legislative and Traffic Safety Committees created for the first time this year. The Legislative Committee appeared before Provincial Cabinets to present the views expressed by member Boards at last year's annual meeting, and will do so again following the present session, while the Safety group conducted a successful campaign among Maritime Boards in the interests of highway safety. Reports of these two committees will be presented at this week's business sessions. Of the 115 community Boards and Chambers located in the Maritimes 51 are actively supporting the M.P.B.T. With available members it is confidently expected that the number of active member Boards will be greatly increased during the coming year.
