FARM LABORERS FROM HOLLAND

REGINA, May 8.—To relieve the farm labor shortage in Saskatchewan and to bring into the country, who, with a little experience in the way of western agriculture will make capable and efficient farm ers, the provincial Government, in cooperation with the federal Department of Immigration, has made arrangements to bring contingents of farm laborers from Holland, it was announced officially today. The Saskatchewan Bureau of Labor and Industries will provide special application forms and other information to agrarians who want the Holland laborers, but the men will not be brought to Canada unless they are guaranteed a year's engagement. Officials of the provincial bureau do not know yet how many men will be brought from the

Netherlands. The demand, however, is expected to be heavy, and there will probably be several hundred to come to the prairies within the next two months.

TRANSFERRED TO PARIS

GENOVA, May 8.—If the Russians do not give a categorical affirmative answer to the memorandum that has been submitted to them, France will not go on with negotiations, and if no arrangement is

made with the Russians the non-aggression pact becomes impossible, said M. Barthou, head of the French delegation to the Economic Conference, to British and United States newspaper correspondents today.
