LET'S EAT

Here's Fastest Way Yet To Get Lunch Or Supper

There were seven of us—four women and three men—gathered in the kitchen for taste-testing. The table was laid with paper doilies, plenty of deep, paper sauce dishes, forks, spoons, a big bowl of crisp vegetable nibblers for flavor and texture contrast, a fruit bowl and a pot of coffee.

MINUTE MEAL
The chef stepped to the range, and from a deep, covered pan half-filled with boiling water, he lifted a dozen one-portion, 8-ounce cans of assorted minute meals. These included beef and lamb stew, chicken stew with dumplings, chicken noodle dinner, chop suey, beef goulash, chili con carne, baked-style beans, Spanish rice, spaghetti with tomato sauce, macaroni Creole and also macaroni in cheese sauce.

VERY TASTY
"They are all very tasty," said Joe the repairman, "but I wish there was more meat or chicken in them." Jimmy, the elevator man, nodded agreement. Ruth suggested that if milk or some other protein were included in the meal it would bring up the protein balance.

"I suggest serving the stews on toast or split biscuits," said Helen.

"To make it more substantial, the macaroni and Spanish rice would be excellent with panned sliced salami or bologna," observed the chef.

"They Building Better Than They Knew" is the caption for a picture in the Federated News which is issued quarterly by the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada. The editor is Mrs. Elsie Orr Laird of Prince Edward Island, an outstanding woman in institute work. The picture shows five of the seven surviving members of the first Women's Institute in the world founded at Stoney Creek. They are Mrs. J. B. Smith, Mrs. McKimley Morden, Mrs. H. P. Van Wagner, Mrs. James Gidden and Mrs. E. J. Smith. Missing from the photo were Mrs. John Bridge and Mrs. Murray Nell. The year, 1957, is one of great moment in the history of the Women's Institutes movement. It marks the 60th anniversary of its founding. The first Women's Institute in Great Britain was founded in Llanfairpwll, Anglesey, September, 1815. Miss Lena McLure who attended the Women's Institute conference in Wales in May, 1954, was given a picture of the lovely old brick and ivy colored building the mother institute. The picture is autographed by two of the remaining charter members, Mrs. W. C. Williams and Mrs. E. Cross. As the overseas visitors remarked on that occasion "It was worth crossing the ocean to look into the faces of such women". The same

can be said of the Canadian women. It is a joy and an inspiration to gaze at the faces of these women who really became women of destiny.

Beta Sigma Phi has conferred international honorary membership on a number of prominent women in many different spheres through the word. Among them are Mrs. Calvin Coolidge, Civic Interests, Senator Iva Falls, government, Lady Fliset, civi interests, The Hon. Nancy Hodges, Madame St. Laurent, civi interests, and world relations, and now Canada's and Prince Edward Island's senator Elsie Inman who is an international honorary member of Beta Sigma Phi sorority.

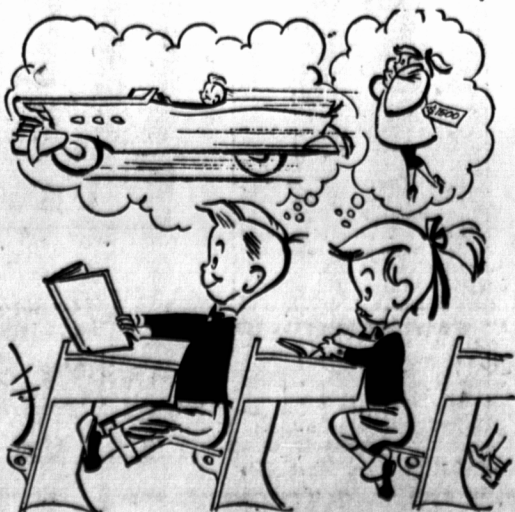
