## EVIDENCE IN ELECTION SCANDAL

### A Deputy Returning Officer Can't be Found

LEFT FOR DAKOTA SUDDENLY,  
FEARING TROUBLE

The Evidence Given Before the Privileges Committee.

OTTAWA, Aug. 2.—In the privileges committee evidence was called to establish the whereabouts of Thomas Farr, the deputy returning officer at Collingwood, at whose poll the manipulation of ballots took place.

The book-keeper of the firm by which Farr was employed testified that Farr suddenly and unexpectedly asked to be paid off, stated that he intended to leave the place. Farr stated that there was trouble about the election.

The witness heard that Farr had received \$500 and a ticket for Dakota and had gone thither.

In Russia 1,500 miles of railroad were completed last year, and there are 7,000 miles in process of construction, while the building of 2,000 miles more has recently been authorized. ### Railway Resolution Comes up To-day

AND A JUDGE FOR QUEEN'S  
COUNTY P. E. I.

Will Also be Made To-day, Says Sir  
Wilfrid Laurier.

OTTAWA, August 2.—Yesterday Thomas Bain was unanimously elected speaker and approved by the Governor-General.

On their return to the Chamber Sir Wilfrid Laurier stated that the railway resolution would come up to-day and that to-day an appointment would be made of County Court judge in P. E. Island. It has been intimated that the appointment will go to Attorney-General McDonald.

### THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND MAGAZINE

The modest cover of the August number of the Prince Edward Island Magazine contains articles of more than ordinary interest to the natives of this Province. In the place of honour is "A Plague of Mice," written by Professor Caven, telling in his interesting manner of the visitations of the mice in 1720 and 1730 when the Island of St. John was literally devastated by the pests. Also dealing with the history of the Province are the contributions on Lot 20, by J. A. Ready, B. A., and the early settlers of St. Eleonors by Hubert G. Compton, both of which conclude their respective subjects. A very instructive article on "The Inauguration of the Suez Canal," by Mr. F. W. Hyrdman, will be read with pleasure, as it is described with all the vividness of an eyewitness. A really valuable contribution is that entitled "Among our Orchids," by Mr. L. W. Watson, which, with the accompanying illustrations, shows that Prince Edward Island is not denied some scions of the royal family of the flower kingdom. There is one poem of unusual merit, "A Life," by May Carroll, and in lighter vein we have "A Day's Trout Fishing," by the Rev. J. W. Godfrey, sure to delight the followers of Isaac Walton; "When Times Wings are Clipped," a short story, by Katherine Hughes, a bright Island girl now in Ottawa, and a continuation of "A Story of Newfoundland," by Hon. Benj. Davies. For a frontispiece the magazine has a very fine photo engraving of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, the best we have yet seen.

—The Czar of Russia has recently placed in the United States a twenty million dollar order for munitions of war. Curiously enough, says an English exchange, the Peace Conference has coincided with a feverish activity in the Russian military and naval departments.
