WARSAW, April 9—(C.P.—Jewish Telegraphic Agency)—A total world Jewish population of 16,240,000 of whom 8,000,000 or 30 per cent live in the America was reported today by the Jewish Scientific Institute.

The survey shows the figure had increased 1,300,000 in the last 10 years. More than 10,000,000 Jews, or two-thirds live in three countries. The United States has 4,450,000, Poland has 3,160,000 and Soviet Russia 3,000,000.
