Swept by Hurricanes.—Severe storms prevailed throughout Wisconsin, Ill., Nebraska, South Dakota and Michigan on Sunday, accompanied by heavy rain, and in several sections with cyclonic manifestations. Three heat storms passed over Chicago, accompanied with heavy gusts and hail. Harlestone fell so thick in some places in that vicinity that they could be taken up by the shovel. After the rain residents of Hyde Park picked up in one spot near by a pick of shells and "gravel." In other places in the suburbs small fishes and turtles were found in large measure. The damage caused by the storm was very great, and several lives have been lost.
