

TRANSPORTATION PROGRESS NOTED IN GOOD ROADS ASS'N BROCHURE

That the use of commercial road transport in the commerce of the nation has been increasing very rapidly is fully shown in the recent issue of "Roads and Streets," published by the Canadian Good Roads Association.

In the year 1910 there were no motor vehicle registrations in this Province, but in 1952 there were 18,717. During the same year the average population per motor vehicle registered was 4.6 for all of Canada and 5.5 for this Province.

Because of the great increase in the number of vehicles Canada has been termed a "Nation on Wheels". In just seven years past the number of vehicles rose from 1,497,001 to 3,155,824 — a jump of 111 percent. At the time the number of commercial vehicles increased from 322,829 to 817,304.

The vast increase in the number of vehicles on the roads meant a great upsurge in expenditures for the highways and it is estimated that now approximately one-third of all Provincial Government expenditures are made on the roads of the Province. The gross highway expenditures, which for this Province were estimated at only \$1,500,000 up to the year 1925, had risen in 1951 to over three million dollars annually. At the same time taxes received from road users amounted to nearly half that amount.

The report notes that the Trans-Canada Highway, being built jointly by the Federal Government and the Provinces, carries an agreement which expires in 1956, but it is apparent that the highway will not be complete by that time and that an extension will have to be arranged for the agreement.

Highway Accidents

Briefly dealing with accident the report goes on to state that most are caused by "speed excessive for road or traffic conditions; the fact that Canada's highways were built for "yesterday, not for tomorrow"; and that we have been wearing out our roads faster than we could repair or replace them.

The motor vehicle death rate shows that in this Province there were 26 persons killed per 10,000 motor vehicles. Only Quebec and New Brunswick had a higher percentage.

In the beginning there was little need for roads in British North America and the principal, and almost only ones, were the military roads maintained by the Government. In general provincial roads were by water in the early days. However, all this was changed nearly two centuries later by the advent of the automobile.

One of the biggest boosts to road building in recent years came with the planning of the Trans-Canada Highway. Up to December 31, 1953 the Federal Government had paid \$1,002,230 as its contribution share of costs of the highway in this Province while its total commitment for that purpose is \$2,542,802.

In the National Park here there are, according to the report, 14 miles of gravel roads. The total across Canada in such parks is 1,914 miles.

Ottawa Inventor Given Recognition

OTTAWA, (CP)—A. J. Langley an Ottawa inventor, finally has received official recognition for his invention of a pencil-shaped time detonator used by Allied saboteurs during the Second World War.

Mr. Langley, former commander in the Royal Navy, has been notified that the United Kingdom royal commission of awards to inventors has recommended that he receive £700 for his invention.

About 15,000,000 of the detonators were used during the war. They enabled saboteurs to set off explosions to go off hours after they left the scene, and were parachuted in large numbers to resistance groups in occupied countries.

He invented the device 15 years ago, and applied for a reward eight years ago.

"I'm happy to know my work has been recognized," he said. "This should end complaints from people who want to contest my patent."

Adverse Factors

The report also makes mention of the fact that wars and economic adversity during the past quarter of a century have set back the normal development of the nation's road systems. It also notes that in 1945 there were 11.4 vehicles for every mile of surfaced highway, whereas by 1952 it had risen to 17.6. Just 30 years ago in 1922 there was a total of 35,791 miles of surfaced highway in Canada, but in 1952 there were 179,000 miles.

The report also lists the many tourist attractions of Canada and recalls the vast amount of "outside" currency spent here as a result of visitors taking their vacations in Canada. It estimates that tourist expenditures have risen from \$86 million in 1921 to \$275 million in 1952. It also states that the tourist trade has done much to make Canada better known throughout the world and has attracted both settlers and investment capital. There was a total of 7,937-132 vehicles entering Canada in 1952.

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, (AP)—Sounding a cautious note of optimism, the magazine Steel says that "possibly the hoped-for turn in the steel market is here."

The weekly summary of the metalworking industry added quickly, however, that with favorable and unfavorable conclusions offsetting each other it still is too early for definite conclusions.

"About the best that can be said," Steel said, "is that the downward trend which started in steel last summer now appears halted, with strong forces for market support present as the situation stabilizes, at least temporarily."

Last week, steel ingot production in the U. S. jumped: two points to 69 per cent of capacity. The belief is that the rate will be around 70 for the next few weeks, Steel said.

The magazine said, "There is no question sentiment is improving despite the continued spottiness in business generally. It some respects this reflects returning confidence attending adjustment of marketing policies to more normal conditions."

With supplies adequate, the report continued, steel purchasing is on a sounder basis than it has been in years.

New York Stocks

NEW YORK, (AP)—The stock market ran into a lot of selling troubles last week, but it had the strength to snap back with vigor.

Douglas Aircraft was a key issue in the drive ahead. During the week it reported doubled earnings in the quarter ended Feb. 28, and directors voted increased dividend payments. Wednesday the stock was up 4 1/2, Thursday it added 5 points, and Friday it surged ahead 8 points to close at 129 1/2—a net gain on the week of 15 1/2.

There were other good earnings reports and other good gains, but none like Douglas.

The market Monday weakened and encountered such selling that the tape was swamped in trying to keep up with reporting actual floor transactions. The market edged out on record with 1,245 issues traded.

The selling didn't spread the next day, and the market fell back only a short distance. It steadied still more on Wednesday when Douglas came through with its earnings report.

By Thursday, the market put on a rally of sorts and managed to close higher on average, although there were a few more losers than gainers that day.

Friday's market made an excellent showing with the aircrafts exceptionally strong and the railroads firm.

Canadian stocks closed higher. International Nickel was up 1/2, Distillers Seagram was ahead 1/2, but Dome Mines dropped 1/2. Royalite Oil, on the American exchange, advanced 1/2.
