Entire String Of Rebel Bases 12 Miles From Hanoi Smashed By Air Raids

HANIO, Indo-China (AP)—Massive air attacks have destroyed an entire string of rebel bases only 12 miles from Hanoi used as springboards for slashing the vital rail-highway link with the seaport city of Haiphong.

This was announced by the French high command which said 30 fighters and 20 bombers Wednesday blew up huge arms depots hidden by the Communist-led Vietminh in villages they occupied near the highway.

Haiphong is the main port for receiving military equipment for the Indo-China war effort. Portions of the road and rail link with Hanoi are blown up almost every night by the rebels and repaired in daylight by French army engineers.

The air assaults on the Vietminh bases were intended both to relieve pressure around Hanoi and to weaken rebel efforts at disrupting the important communications link with Haiphong.

BEAT OFF ATTACK

Tuesday night Viet Namese troops beat off another attempt by the rebels to overwhelm the defence post of Chanoi near Hung Yen, 40 miles southeast of Hanoi.

French planes gave close support to the Viet Namese while arms, ammunition and food were dropped to the defenders.

A high command spokesman said that otherwise the situation in the delta Wednesday was calm. Five Vietminh were reported killed and 18 captured in minor mopups.

The high command announced that in accordance with an agreement reached at Geneva, 575 rebel wounded and sick prisoners will be released within five days as a reciprocal measure for the freeing of 888 French-Union wounded and

27 medical men from fallen Dien Bien Phu.

At Saigon, a munitions dump explosion, possibly due to sabotage, killed a Viet Namese woman and marred the celebration of Unity Day, called to underline Viet Namese protests of any decisions by the Geneva conference to divide their country. Viet Namese troops paraded in both Saigon and Hanoi.

Australia Needs Foreign Capital

WINNIPEG, (CP)—Sir Douglas Copland, Australian high commissioner to Canada, said today that Australia has the greatest outside need of any country in the sterling area.

"Of all members of the sterling area Australia is developing at the greatest rate and is, therefore, most in need of foreign capital, foreign supplies of certain goods and markets outside the sterling area," he said.

Sir Douglas made his comments in a paper prepared for delivery to the annual meeting of the

Canadian Financial Science Association.

He said it was not "a mere coincidence" that Australia first put forward proposals designed to lead toward the convertibility of sterling at the finance minister's conference in January 1952.

"Fortunately," Sir Douglas said, "official policy in the sterling area, together with a generally more favorable economic climate, have made it possible for substantial progress to be made toward the goal of ultimate convertibility."
