Major Mau Mau Raid Defeated

NAIROBI, Kenya, (Reuters) - Security forces Wednesday beat back a major Mau Mau terrorist raid and killed possibly 50 members of the anti-white terrorist cult. The raid began when about 50 terrorists, armed with automatics and sub-machine-guns, attacked Thika Golf Club, 25 miles north-east of here. They tied up the negro barman, then hacked him to pieces with heavy knives. The gang then ambushed a nearby screening team and shot and slashed a native headman to death.

About two miles from the club the gang attacked a police post killing a native policeman and wounding two white assistant inspectors, before police caught up with them.

Says Many Toronto Drivers Drink At Night

TORONTO, (CP)—Rev. Dr. J.R. Mulchor claims that half the automobile drivers on Toronto streets after midnight have been drinking. "After midnight from Monday to Thursday every other person driving a car has consumed alcohol," the secretary of the evangelism and social service department of the United Church of Canada said Tuesday at a meeting of Toronto clergy presbytery. Snowy Owls From Arctic Fly South Seeking Food

By Henry Baker Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO, (CP) - This is a "snowy owl winter," with the big, ghost-like birds of the Arctic migrating south in search of food. Every four years the snowy owls are starved out of their tundra home by the disappearance of the lemming, an arctic rodent. Every four years the lemming virtually disappears in a plague or in mad migrations to the sea. And in these bad years the snowy owls are forced southward, most of them to stay.

Some fly as far south as Texas, Georgia or southern California, feeding by day on mice and rats. A few have turned up in Bermuda. Most of the migrants settle on the eastern coast of the United States or in the Great Lakes region. Stately Flights James Baillie, assistant director of ornithology at the Ontario Museum of Natural History, says Ontario and Quebec observers this winter have spotted some of the biggest flights of snowy owls ever seen in this part of the country. In the Toronto area alone, 17 birds were sighted in one day around Christmas.

With five-foot wingspread and a froth of white feathers covering them from claws to beak, they're impressive creatures and often frighten superstitious people by their ghost-like appearance. Accustomed to the long Arctic night in the north, they see equally well by day. In their flight south, some of them stop in farmlands of the Canadian provinces. Others continue to the open country of the middle United States.

Known as "garfanti" to ornithologists, the snowy owl differs in several respects from his cousin, the horned owl. He is completely rounded, smooth headed; the horned owl, like most other types, has ear tufts. The garfanti's life span is only five to 10 years. Aerial Hunter South of the Arctic, he feeds in the daytime. Though lemmings are his bread and butter dish, he won't pass up a hare or a fat come to it so far as we are concerned.
