J. G. Campbell Nominated By Liberals In 3rd Kings

Campbell, Popular Point, was the unanimous choice of the delegates assembled in convention at Cardigan Hall last evening to represent the 3rd, District of King's in the forthcoming by-election. 55 delegates from eleven polls were present, together with a large number of interested men and women and an array of Liberal speakers.

The nomination of Mr. Campbell, whose name was the only one to appear before the convention, was moved by Mr. Lorne Wigginton, Montague, and seconded by Mr. Warren MacDonald of Dundas.

The meeting was presided over by the district president, Hugh MacEachern. Mr. Eugene Dunn acted as secretary.

A committee including Messrs. L. H. Poole, Russell MacAulay and Abner Dewar was appointed on the resolutions committee. The credentials committee comprised J. A. Anwar, Stan Burke and MacKenzie.

Following his nomination, Mr. Campbell thanked the delegates for the confidence which they had placed in him, and stated that he would do all in his power to be worthy of the confidence. He stressed the need for more complete organization and support, and said that he would put forth every effort to do his part. He spoke at length regarding federal and provincial issues in the coming campaign.
