Rev. Father E. Baldwin spoke for a few minutes on "Reformation of Society", and commented on its relation to "Reformation of individuals". He stated that individuals can help themselves by admission of their faults and the admission of God, and by bringing these admissions to God. Speaking of the physical effect of alcohol, Dr. W. H. Soper stated that alcohol is a drug and a poison. He told of the partial loss of self control and will power caused from its use, and quoted "Wine does not help us to do a thing well, but makes us less ashamed to do it badly". Dr. Soper compared alcohol under control to a fire which gives warmth and comfort, and alcohol out of control to a raging forest fire. Dealing with the A. A.'s policy of no time limit pledges, the Rev. H. E. D. Ashford quoted, "As thy days, so shall thy strength be". He gave three rules, which he said could be well applied to A. A.'s, as follows: (1) Never be afraid of people. (2) Never collect inanimate objects, or they will collect you. (3) Always laugh at yourself first. Mr. Ashford also stated that his work is made much easier because of the A. A., and that drinking does not drown sorrow, it only irritates it. The women's angle toward alcoholism was also dealt with very fully in a talk which asked the ladies in the audience to practice tolerance. Although it is so easy to become impatient, wives and mothers of alcoholics can only attain tranquility of spirit by the practice of tolerance. Miracles do not happen every day, and the miracle of an alcoholic's starting the A. A. program should be sufficient. The speaker also expressed the thought that it is better to make the mistake of attributing good intentions to everyone, than to make one mistake of misjudging a fellow man. The Anniversary cake was cut by the oldest member and the youngest member of the club. Refreshments were served, and the meeting brought to a close with a hearty sing song. MOSCOW, May 14 (AP)—Trygve Lie, United Nations secretary-general, conferred for an hour Saturday with Andrei A. Gromyko, Russia's deputy foreign minister. Lie is holding a round of conferences with top Russian officials in an effort to ease east-west tensions. After meeting with Gromyko, former Soviet delegate to the U. N., Lie saw Arkady A. Sobolev, a former U. N. assistant secretary-general now working in the Kremlin. The U. N. secretary-general conferred Friday with Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky.

Time Changes For Eastern Trains

MONCTON, N. B., May 15 — Changes in Canadian National train schedules between Charlottetown, Souris, Elmira and Georgetown are announced, effective May 21 next. Souris — Between Charlottetown and Souris, train now leaving Charlottetown at 2:30 p. m., daily except Sunday, will arrive at Souris at 5:30 p. m. on Tuesdays and Saturdays, and at 6:30 p. m. on the other days of the week. Train leaving Souris at 7:30 a. m. will arrive Charlottetown at 10:20 a. m. Tuesdays and Saturdays and at 11:00 a. m. on the other days of the week. Train leaving Charlottetown at 7:30 a. m. and Souris at 1:30 p. m. Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays will be cancelled. Elmira — The service between Souris and Elmira will be operated leaving Souris on Mondays at 6:45 p. m. and Tuesdays at 5:45 p. m. making connection at Souris with train from Charlottetown. Train will leave Elmira for Souris at 6:30 a. m. on Tuesdays and Wednesdays only, the service on Friday and Saturday being cancelled, and will make connection with train for Charlottetown. Georgetown — On Thursdays train will leave Mount Stewart Junction for Georgetown at 4:00 p. m. instead of 3:45 p. m., the other services remaining as at present.

Yorath Is Named McKee Cup Winner

OTTAWA, May 14 (CP)—Denis K. Yorath, veteran pilot and Edmonton businessman, today was named winner of the McKee trophy for 1949, Canada's highest aviation award. The trophy, awarded annually since 1927, is presented for outstanding service in the advancement of Canadian aviation. The citation covering the award to the past president of the Royal Canadian Flying Clubs Association said Mr. Yorath had served the Association "as one of its most able and energetic chief executives."

It won't be wiped out until the prostitute's customer is punished along with the woman who sells herself, the Council said in its annual report for 1949.
